



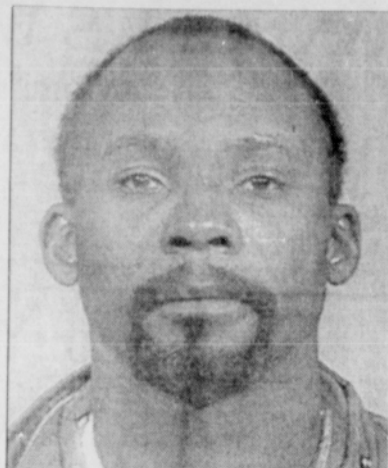
## Police News Crime Stoppers

### Reward Offered In Murder Case

Portland Police Bureau homicide detectives, in cooperation with Crime Stoppers, are asking for your help in identifying and apprehending the person or persons responsible for a homicide.

On Friday, Sept. 29 at about 9:40 p.m., officers responded to a report of a shooting at the intersection of North Killingsworth Court and North Albina Avenue. A caller had reported a man staggering in the street asking for help.

On arrival, officers found

the body of Phillip Elliot Green, a 33 year-old black male, lying on the sidewalk. Greene died from injuries caused by a gunshot wound to the face.

Witnesses in the area reported hearing a gunshot, followed by the sound of a vehicle leaving the scene.

Stope Stoppers is offering a cash reward of up to \$1,000 for information, reported to Crime Stoppers, which leads to an arrest in this case or any unsolved felony crime, and you need not give your name.

### Marijuana, Guns, Cash Seized

Police officers from the Portland Police Bureau's gang enforcement team served a search warrant Nov. 9 at a northeast Portland residence and seized several pounds of marijuana.

Officers searched a mobile home in a trailer park at 9000 N.E. Martin Luther King Jr.

Blvd. with a drug detecting dog from the Gresham Police Department and found five and a half pounds of marijuana. Officers also seized almost \$11,000 in cash, a shotgun and a rifle.

Arrested for possession and distribution of a controlled substance and lodged in jail was Dale Allen

Osterberg, 41. Officers also arrested and cited John Warren Osterberg, 40, for frequenting and maintaining a place where drugs are sold and possession of less than an ounce of marijuana.

The investigation began when officers received information from citizen.

### Man Shot In Laurelhurst Neighborhood

A Tuesday, Nov. 14 shooting killed a 24-year-old northeast Portland man.

The incident occurred about 8:45 p.m. Neighbors said they heard several shots and Portland Police, upon investigating, found Brian T. Mitchell on the ground next to his car. Mitchell had suffered gunshot

wound to the head and leg. He was transported to Emanuel Hospital and died the next morning.

Apparently, Mitchell had just parked his vehicle across the street from his residence when the shooting occurred in the 4300 block of Northeast Hazelfern Place in the Laurelhurst neighborhood.

A vehicle was seen leaving the area just after the shooting, but it was unclear whether the shooter was in a car or on foot. One round also struck a door jamb at a residence south of Mitchell's location. No one was injured at that home.

No suspects were arrested.

### Organized Crime Agency Seeks Help

The Regional Organized Crime Narcotics (ROCN) Task force has begun a campaign to generate information on individuals and organizations involved in the large scale distribution, importation into Oregon, or the manufacture of illegal controlled substances (drugs).

ROCN, a multi-agency investiga-

tive drug unit, wants to furnish the opportunity for individuals to provide information or act as agents to facilitate long term drug investigations. Investigators at ROCN are available to take calls Monday through Friday, 9 AM to 5 PM., at (503) 234-8892.

The task force is also seeking information and assistance on large scale drug investigations. ROCN fo-

cuses on individuals and organizations that are involved in the large scale distribution of illegal controlled substances (ie, over one pound of cocaine) as well as the manufacture and importation, into Oregon, of these drugs.

Persons interested in cooperation or providing specific information may be eligible for rewards.

the opportunity to have input into the decision.

"The bank would like to know the racial composition of this newly formed committee that ruled against the Gladys McCoy Memorial and the bank's privately-funded park," demanded Booker, the bank's chief executive officer.

The minority-owned bank is demanding investigation and review of Tri-Met's decision which it believes was "racially insensitive."

The process used to determine whether or not the bus stop

should be moved. Elliot Neighborhood Association Land Use Committee Chairperson Steve Rogers explained, included two land use committee meetings in May and July with the bank, Tri-Met and local riders represented.

Rogers said the committee voted both times to move the bus stop back.

He said other meetings were held with McCoy family members in attendance and that these meetings were called to help design an acceptable agreement, which the bank ultimately rejected.

In a letter to the Tri-Met Board Chairperson Phil Bogue, the associ-

ation said it acquired the written commitment of the Volunteer of America's Men's Residential Center to include the bus shelter in their litter clean-up sweeps.

The neighborhood group also has the support of the Association of Liaison Police Officers and also of the Rider Advocates Program of Northeast Coalition of Neighborhoods to take special care of the area.

But the bank was not convinced that these commitments would save the monument from filth.

"What if they fail to clean the place? How are you going get them to do it," Booker queried.
