Marine Biologist Honored On Stamp

ternationally renown zoologist, has become the 19th honoree in the U.S. Postal Service's Black Heritage Stamp series.

Known primarily for his research in marine biology, Just did pioneering experiments in the process of fertilization in marine invertebrates. He also studied the fundamental role of the cell surface in the develop-

ment of organisms.

Just received early recognition for his work as the first recipient of the Spingarn Medal awarded by the NAACP "to a man or a woman of African descent and American citizenship who shall have made the highest achievement during the preceding year or years in any honorable field of human endeavor." Throughout the 1930s, Just conducted research in institutes and marine laboratories in Berlin, Germa-
