Gospel music stars will brighten Portland at ecumenical workshop, concert, seminar, and Oregon premiere of new gospel mass

'St. Martin de Porres Mass' to be sung in cathedral by massive gospel choir from Oregon, Washington. Protestants, Catholics, blacks, whites, young, old people come together to celebrate new gospel music with national gospel artists, composers.

Gospel music is the music that seeks universal truths beyond mere entertainment, and this city's lively community of gospel songwriters and musicians will play host to an important attempt to show off the miracle of this peculiarly American invention in an important large church as part of the Catholic Church's 150th anniversary in Oregon celebration in February.

Two nationally-known gospel music composers will preside over a workshop, a seminar, four rehearsals, and two concerts during an indepth look at gospel music for Catholic and other European-heritage churches in Portland during a fourday event produced and directed by Joyce Boles of Albina Arts Center, during Black History Month in February.

Rev. Milton Biggham, perhaps the most well-known producer and composer working in gospel music today, will join with Leon Roberts, a well-known Catholic gospel music composer will work together with members of the Washington State and Portland-Vancouver chapters of the Gospel Music Workshop of American, with the Pacific Northwest Mass Choir, and with the Portland Black Catholic Lay Caucus to produce the four days of study and singing, said Boles.

Biggham is president of Savoy Records in New York, and is associated with nationally well-known choirs such as Georgia Mass Choir, Florida Mass Choir, and New Jersey Mass Choir. The winner of two Grammies, he has produced wellknown singers such as the late Rev. James Cleveland, Rev. Clay Evans,

the Aniointed Pace Sisters, and several others. He has been named the producer of the year several times by the Gospel Music Workshop of America. Rev. Biggham is also pastor of Mt. Vernon Baptist Church in northern New Jersey.

The term "mass choir" means among African-Americans a large choir singing black gospel music. The mass choir movement has found expression in at least 40 U.S. locations

Biggham is expected to teach and direct his own new music at the workshop, which will be followed with a 7 pm Saturday concert at Maranatha Church, 4222 NE 12th Ave., where the Portland Metropolitan Youth Mass choir will also appear, said Boles

Prominent local gospel music director, keyboard player, and songwriter Minister Terry Davis is music director of the event. Davis was the winner recently of a Community Treasure award from TACS. He directs the large Portland Metropolitan

Youth Mass Choir, and is co-director of Portland Mass Choir. Davis is also music director of the local BMWA chapter. He has several songs recorded on different gospel music albums in national distribution. Minister is an honorific used among African-American church people for a churchman who is not ordained.

Leon Roberts was director of liturgical music at St. Augustine parish in Washington, DC, for 15 years. He is author of the widelysung "St. Augustine Mass," which is published in "Lead Me, Guide M," the first African-American hymnal ever published in the United States. His music also appears in Episcopal and United Church of Christ hymnals. He is currently the Florence Van Keuren Artist in Residence at the Concord Baptist Church of Christ in Brooklyn, NY

Roberts will teach and direct his new composition, "The St. Martin de Porres Mass," to be sung at the 5:30 pm mass at St. Mary's Cathedral Sunday, Feb. 18. Boles said she ex-

pects a 100 to 200-voice choir to sing the mass, which will be celebrated by Fr. Nicolaus Marandu of Immaculate Heart Parish, as part of the reopening of the refurbished St. Mary's Cathedral, 1716 NW Davis. Fr. Marandu is a native of Tanzania, and is the only priest of color in western Oregon.

Music for both the mass and the concert will be rehearsed at two evening rehearsals, 7-10 pm at Immaculate Heart Church, 2930 N. Williams Avenue, and by a 3 pm Saturday rehearsal at Maranatha Church 4222 NE 12th Ave., and by a 3:30 pm rehearsal at St. Mary's Cathedral.

Both Biggham and Roberts will instruct during a 9-1 pm workshop Saturday morning, "How to get your music recorded and published." The workshop cost \$5 per participant for four rehearsals and two concerts. The seminar costs \$30, and one quarter hour credit from Portland State University is available for an additional charge of \$35. Both the concert and

the celebrated mass will be free and open to the public. Free-will offerings will be taken at both.

Both Biggham and Roberts will meet with local artists and writers by appointment only. Call 284-9043 to schedule an appointment on the afternoons of Feb. 15 and 16.

This workshop with the other events is the most ambitious project so far for both Albina Arts Center and the Portland-Vancouver chapter of GMWA, said Boles. This may also be the first time serious gospel music has been sung in the Oregon cathedral as part of a regular mass, she said. Major sponsorship of the event has been provided by the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon, and by Oregon Catholic Press
