Carbon Monoxide Detectors Can Save Lives

season still two months away, carbon monoxide poisoning remains a threat in Oregon. Unfortunately, it is a threat some Oregonians may not appreciate until it's too late. An industry resource group esti-

With the end of the home heating

mates that carbon monoxide poisoning kill 1,500 people a year, representing fully half of the fatal poisoning in the United States. But only 19 percent of Americans believe that in their otherwise normal-looking homes, an invisible killer could be present.

Just last week, Portland General Electric's Joann Woods fielded a customer service call from a Beaverton woman whose carbon monoxide detector was going off. Woods said she instructed the woman to open windows and doors to let in fresh air. After following Woods' instructions, the alarm shut off.

"She thought something was wrong with the detector. What she forgot about was that she had let her

car warm up in the garage earlier. She didn't realize that carbon monoxide from the garage was seeping into her house," Woods said.

A colorless, odorless gas, carbon monoxide can accumulate to toxic levels without occupants even knowing it. Early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning resemble flu, causing headaches, fatigue, nausea and dizziness. Prolonged exposure can render victims unconscious and eventually can lead to death.

In December's wind storm, a Hillsboro family nearly died of carbon monoxide poisoning from burning a charcoal barbecue grill in their house for heat after they lost power. The 9-1-1 dispatcher who took the emergency call instructed the family to open all windows and get to an open doorway.

When paramedics arrived, they found the family lying unconscious on the living room floor near the front door.

The main source of carbon mon-

oxide in homes is faulty or improperly installed appliances that operate on combustible fuel, like propane, gas, oil, coal or wood. Industry experts estimate that 63 percent of American homes are equipped with fireplaces.

"Carbon monoxide is a particular threat here in Oregon, since so many people use wood-burning stoves and fireplaces for heat," said Nancy Miller, PGE's home safety product man-

Oregon's stringent building codes also can contribute to carbon monoxide problems, Miller said. While the extra insulation and sealing required by state codes minimize drafts, these "tight" homes also can trap carbon monoxide. Chicago already mandates carbon monoxide detectors in homes. Several states, including Washington, are considering similar legislation.

"In time, carbon monoxide detectors will take their place beside smoke detectors in every home," Miller said.
