

The challenge for Whitsitt is getting equal value for one of the top five point guards in the league. Strickland's trade value has fallen with the publicity of his fall-out with Carlisimo. Whitsitt hands are tied and the general managers around the league know it. # Tyson In **Trouble** Again

Mike Tyson could go back to prison if it is determined that he violated the terms of his release after a complaint that he sexually assaulted another woman.

The WBA heavyweight champion, on probation for for a 1992 rape conviction, is restricted to Ohio whole police investigate the complaint. During the investigation in Chicago, Tyson can only leave is home state for emergencies for for other reasons approved in advance.

Last week a Gary, Ind. woman claimed she met Tyson at the Clique, a popular South Side Chicago nightspot and that he kissed her and bit her face. She also said he touched her on an unspecified part of her body and forced her to touch him.

Tyson served six years of a 10 year sentence for raping a contestant in the Miss Black America pageant before being placed on probation in 1995.

If authorities find Tyson violated his probation, they could tighten the restrictions or add other conditions like electronic monitoring. At worse he could have to finish the last four years of his original sentence.
