Fighting Youth Crime Through Literacy

Plummeting scholastic ratings predict a growing segment of society unable to hold jobs, while deep-seated poverty in the inner-city has manifested in more than 1 million. Americans who live behind bars and more than 800 more out of every 10,000 who are victims of violent crime. Law enforcement experts are predicting a grim future traced to a failed education system.

The Compton-based World Literacy Crusade has been successfully tackling the problem head-on through a program of community empowerment. One inner-city librarian in Memphis, Tennessee, calls the Crusade "a metamorphosis."

Johnson, who has used the study methods of L. Ron Hubbard in his program for more than three years. > A community leader in Memphis who worked with Johnson to launch the Crusade in Hayes' home town,

says it is the most "effective program" he has seen in his field in 35 years. A story that illustrates the program's effectiveness is that of a seemingly hopeless individual with a second grade level education who did the program early on in Compton. He was able to complete it and went on to become a medical nurse, passing his accreditation exam with very high marks. The difference, after the program, was he could read and understand a technical field. And the result, he is a contributing member of society.

But what the World Literacy Crusade will mean to youth is perhaps even more profound. The program

has taken gang members---young men who joined gangs rather than participate in a society they feel excludes them--right off the street. These are the affects of the World Literacy Crusade that have led to its rapid expansion.

Reverend Johnson took matters into his own hands when he began the crusade. Today it is poised to become a national effort against illiteracy and ultimately against crime. For more information about the World Literacy Crusade, call (310) 637-2273.
