Dole Explores Future

he denounced Fidel Castro at a Free Cuba rally in Miami.

And each of those appearances dwarfed Dole's remarks to a raceway full of stock-car fans in North Carolina on Saturday. That lasted about 30 seconds - including, "Gentlemen, start your engines.'

After Dole gave his resignation speech in Washington last Wednesday, he flew to Chicago for a quick and celebratory thrust to the city where Democrats will renominate President Clinton this summer.

But a speech on welfare he is to give in Wisconsin, which had been scheduled before Dole made his announcement, will mark the first full-bore campaign event since his resignation and, his aides hope, the first indication of how Dole will run as a former Washington legislator.

On one hand, as Dole remarked, it is unrealistic to expect a campaign to maintain the level of excitement that he initially created. "I can't resign every day," Dole said. But more significantly, what these past few days have revealed is the price his staff is paying for Dole's success at keeping his decision to quit a secret from all but two advisers and his wife, Elizabeth.

Dole's staffhad constructed a strategy on the foundation of his remaining the Senate majority leader.

Now that Dole is going from being the Republican Party's senior elected official to private citizen, his campaign advisers - most of whom were as surprised as everyone else at the news - have been forced to accommodate a change.

This challenge - essentially, the reconstruction of a campaign strategy - is not solely a logistical problem for political strategists.

Asked the single most important benefit of quitting, Dole pointed his left finger to his temple and said: "Think. Think about the campaign. And not, 'When are you going to get my bill up?'

Dole said he viewed it as an opportunity to consider why he was running for president and how to explain his candidacy to the public.

"Before long, I won't be in Washington or a senator," Dole said aboard his campaign plane. "And then I have a right to - then I can go out and define who Bob Dole really is. What his ideas are and his agenda and his socalled vision for America.


