Thomas Hagley Jr. Award

Vancouver Mayor Royce E. Pollard announced Tuesday, June 25 that Thomas Hagley, Jr. is the recipient of the 1996 General George C. Marshall Public Leadership Award.

A special award ceremony will take place at the Marshall House to honor Hagley on Thursday, July 11.

Hagley was nominated by Dr. James Parsley, Superintendent of Vancouver Public Schools. He is currently working as Assistant to the Superintendent, Community & Intergovernmental Relations for Vancouver Public Schools. He holds a Bachelor of Arts and History from Whitman College and is currently exploring doctoral programs to advance his career in educational leadership and public service.

The recipient must be 30 years of age or younger, have a four-year college degree, reside in Clark County and demonstrate leadership

The Marshall Award was started in 1989 and recognizes a local individual's commitment to public service. It is presented in honor of the public service legacy of General George C. Marshall, U.S. Army Chief of Staff during World War II, Secretary of State under President Truman and 1953 Nobel Peace Prize Laureate. From 1936 to 1938 Marshall served as commander of Vancouver Barracks and lived in the house that now bears his name on Officers Row.

In support of Hagley, Dr. Parsley says, "I have known few young people with as much potential for community leadership as Tom." He adds, "Tom grew up in a home where community involvement was a family value." Hagley has devoted time to the Citizens' Committee for Good Schools and the Columbia River Regional Education Compact. He enjoys outdoor recreation in his spare

fireworks barge, which will be anchored east of the I-5 Bridge. Boaters are cautioned to stay away from the barge. Boats are not allowed on the Washington beach from I-5 to Marine Park.

Law enforcement agencies will check boats for overloading, flotation devices, alcohol overuse and other violations.

Fourth of July **May Pose Danger For Pets**

The rockets red glare... the bombs bursting in air... they are all a part of celebrating our nation's birthday. But the noise and the lights that we enjoy on this holiday can be terrifying to our pets. Every year animal shelters are flooded with lost pets right after the 4th of July. In fact, more animals run away or are lost because of this holiday than any other time of the year. Pet owners need to take some basic precautions to protect their pets:

1. Keep your pets indoors all night. Many dogs will jump fences in an attempt to escape the noise.

2. If you are not at home to calm your pets, leave a radio on to provide soothing background sounds and to help drown out the sound of the

3. Isolate your pets in a smaller

room, preferable one with no windows, to help insulate them from what's going on outside. Dogs have been known to jump through living room windows, again to escape the noise.

4. Keep current identification on your pets at all times. Just in case your pet does get out, or lost, this is their best chance of being returned to

5. If your pet should become lost, begin looking for it immediately! Don't wait, thinking it may find its own way home. The fireworks will disorient and confuse him or her. And pets can travel a long distance in a short time so the sooner you begin to look, the better your changes are of finding your pet.

6. Call the Vancouver Human Society. If your pet becomes lost, the

Society will help you find your pet. Visit the shelter to look for your pet and to fill out a lost pet report. Or if you have found a wandering pet you can call and let us know where the pet is, or bring it to the shelter.

The Vancouver Humane Society is the largest animal shelter in southwest Washington, caring for more 7,000 animals last year. The Society is a non-profit organization dedicated to preventing cruelty to animals, providing care for homeless and distressed animals, and educating the public about proper animal care.
