Enron to Buy Portland General

Enron says it's signed a definitive agreement to acquire Portland General Corp., in a \$2.1 billion stock deal that will create one of the biggest utility companies in the nation. Coming amid a consolidation in the industry propelled by big customers seeking power from cheaper sources, the deal is anticipated to have a major impact.

Wash Mutual to Acquire Keystone

Washington Mutual says it's signed an agreement to acquire Keystone Holdings Inc. and its American Savings Bank subsidiary in a stock swap. Washington Mutual said the deal would create a banking company with more than \$42 billion in assets, \$23 billion of deposits and 500 offices in seven Western states.

Media General Deal Announced

Media General, capping a year of aggressive growth, says it will acquire Park Acquisitions Inc., for \$710 million in cash. Park Acquisitions is the parent of media conglomerate Park Communications

US, Japan Agree on Chip Format

Japan and the United States' top microchip makers have agreed on a format for flash memory microchips, joining hands in the race to develop the market for the next generation of electronic devices. Intel and Advanced Micro Devices of the United States and Japan's Fujitsu and Sharp agreed today to standardize the software interface of their flash memories, basically making their products compatible with each oth-

Intel to Offer Free Software

Intel says it will begin offering free software that will make it easier for personal computer users to make long-distance telephone calls over the Internet global computer network. The program will be available on the Internet starting Wednesday. It embraces a new technology that will allow users of different computers and telephone software to talk to each other.

Energy Companies Report Earnings

Texaco, Mobil, Amoco and Atlantic Richfield reported strong second-quarter earnings today, as demand surged while oil and natural gas supplies shrank and prices soared. Exxon's profits edged lower from year-ago record levels as the company spent more on capital and exploration, and Occidental Petroleum's results were hurt by lower transport margins.

At the heart of the matter are fierce negotiations with Air India over a plane order for the company's Medium Capacity-Long Range (MCLR) requirement.

Industry observers believe Air India requires some 10 long-range aircraft seating between 200 and 400 passengers.

Boeing is pitting its newest 777 craft against the Airbus 340 in the latest confrontation between the two companies, which are fighting for dominance of the world civil plane

Boeing is still selling more planes than its younger European rival but the four-nation consortium is intent on grabbing at least half of the multibillion-dollar market.

In the first six months of 1996, Airbus won 48 percent of new orders for planes with more than 100 seats. Boeing took 49 percent and McDonnell Douglas Corp. took the rest.

Both manufacturers have made bids to Air India, but the airline has asked the makers to improve their

The spokesman could not say how long the negotations with Air India could last nor the size of the order, which he said would be "important."

Air India operates a fleet of Boeing 747 planes and some smaller types,

including the Airbus 310.

Airbus executives have recently said that they saw the market for new planes in the Indian subcontinent -India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka — at 400 planes worth \$30 billion in the next two decades. Over half will be for India.

Airbus Industrie is a consortium made up of French state-owned Societe Nationale Industrielle Aerospatiale, British Aerospace Plc, Daimler-Benz Aerospace, a unit of Daimler-Benz AG, and Construcciones Aeronauticas SA of Spain.

Continental Airlines and Northwest Airlines reported sharply higher second-quarter earnings today, boosted by small increases in average fares and gains in passenger traffic as the summer vacation season started. Continental, the nation's fifth largest carrier, said the quarter was its most profitable quarter ever.

Northwest, the No. 4 airline, said profits nearly doubled in the quarter, traditionally a strong one for the nation's airlines. While the results exceeded expectations on Wall Street, the stocks of both airlines fell on investors' concerns that a slowdown in the economy could hurt results later this year.

Ryder Earnings

Plunge

Ryder System said today its earnings plunged 39 percent in the second quarter and it's negotiating to sell its consumer truck rental unit. The company said it earned \$31.6 million, or 39 cents a share, versus earnings of \$51.4 million, or 65 cents a share, in the second quarter of 1995.

Revenues rose to \$1.4 billion from \$1.3 billion. Ryder said the results in the latest quarter included a charge of 15 cents a share to cover a costcutting program.

Excluding those charges, Ryder said it would have earned 54 cents a share.
