If the White House were for sale Hottest real estate in but one thing is certain — the 42,840-"The White House is an interna-It cost \$232,372 to build nearly 200

years ago. In the 1960s, its estimated replacement value was \$11 million. If the White House — home to President Clinton and coveted by Bob Dole were put on the market today, its asking price would be \$63,893,550, according to a survey released Thursday by a leading national real estate firm.

In a first-of-its-kind survey that yielded responses from the whimsical to down-to-the-penny seriousness, Coldwell Banker Residential Affiliates Inc. polled a group of its top Realtors nationwide to come up with a suggested asking price, assuming the home was for sale.

Uniquely qualified to conduct the survey, Coldwell Banker was involved in the sale of nearly 1,000 properties worth \$1 million or more last year.

The listing price would vary depending upon which Realtor you ask, square-foot (excluding basement) White House, perched on 18 acres of prime, downtown property, is an irreplaceable national icon.

"The house is the most well built in the country, if not the world," said Mike Melton, administrative officer of the White House Historical Society.

Coldwell Banker polled its Previews Program property specialists from coast to coast, asking them to estimate the value of this irreplaceable national monument and its land. Coldwell Banker Previews property specialists are professional Realtors, experienced in the marketing of luxury

The White House Historical Association's Melton said he recalls seeing a document that indicated it would cost more than \$11 million to replace the property during the 1960s.

The Alameda-Santa Clara County border and the San Mateo-Santa Clara County border may be the hottest real estate market in the country today, as the major players in the electronics and software industries look for room to expand, say executives at CB Commercial Real Estate, Inc.

Land prices in Fremont, for example, have virtually doubled in the past two years, according to Douglas A. Norton, vice president, industrial properties, in CB Commercial's Oakland office. "Our firm has had record sales in the region in the first two quarters of this year, and we expect to see the trend continuing for the next three to five years," he said.

In the late 80s, vacancy rates as high as 20 percent were common in the East Bay and South Bay, Norton said. But today there are vacancy rates of under 3 percent in Fremont, North San Jose, Foster City, Menlo Park and Palo Alto.

"But today we are starting to see some speculative building, and there is also an abundant source of capital. The pension funds are willing to invest in suburban office space, as well as space for research and development, manufacturing and warehousing.'

The demand for real estate on the northern borders of Silicon Valley is spilling over into adjacent communities, particularly along the Interstate 580/680 corridor, and this is turn is spurring some companies to move back into the central

Pleasanton, Norton pointed out, two years ago had vacancy rates of 20 to 22 percent while the vacancy rate is now hovering around 5 percent. At the same time rents in the area have gone up from \$1.25 per square foot to \$1.45 to \$1.75.

The project, located at the gateway to Martin Luther King Boulevard and the Albina community, was designed to set a high standard for future development on the boulevard.

Voluntary two-floor set backs provide more usable sidewalks; covered walkways, awning and an interior courtyard add to the design.

The courtyard features masonry pavers, three large trees, built-in seating, cast iron lights, a fountain, and four bronze wildlife sculptures.

"The courtyard was designed to be an amenity because the residents live in a busy, urban neighborhood," said Wilcox. "I think it's working wonder-

the project. Meetings were held with Elliott neighborhood residents, and the Albina Community Plan was followed throughout the design and construction phases of the building.

Federal Low-Income Housing Tax Credits, and 10 other funding sources provided the \$4.7 million needed to pay for the project.

The designers also received major corporate funding to organize an MLK Summit of business, residential, nonprofit and government parties.

Those involved in the summit worked to address transportation, economic development, housing and arts issues.
