## MJCC Theater to premier new musical by local playwright

MJCC Theater Artistic Director Mark Steering's original musical, In Small Doses, will be presented at the Mittleman Jewish Community Center from November 2-17th. Steering wrote the book, music and lyrics for In Small Doses and will be directing this premiere production.

In Small Doses is about three over-committed roommates; Randy: A Jewish, gay opera singer (Matthew Clark), TJ: a type "A" playwright with writer's block (Sally Eames), and Sabrina: a struggling African-American actress (Dorceia McCullough). During a particularly hectic week, their extraordinary sets of parents show up unexpectedly for the weekend. The parents show up unexpectedly for the weekend. The parental units include; a Jewish/Buddhist mom (Jan Rosenthal), an overachieving gay dad (Costa Co-

lumbus) with his nurturing lover (Maury Evans), and an overprotective, conservative African-American couple (Mary Davis and Fie Wash). Throw in Sabrina's political activist boyfriend (Martin Waugh) who is white and twice her age, and you've got a show that is chock full of comic situations, but also deals with poignant issues of our time. In Small Doses transcends age, race and gender as it explores the pitfalls of overcommittment, acceptance of diversity and universal challenge of family relationships.

Originally from upstate New York, Steering graduated from Ithaca College with a degree in Performing and Expressive Arts. As MJCC Theater artistic director he is in charge of four major productions per year, as well as theater classes and camps. In April Mark was selected as one of the composers in the Composer/Librettist Studio given by the New Music-Theater Ensemble of St. Paul, MN. This was a national residency program (locally sponsored by the Portland Opera) where five composers and five librettists were teamed up in various combinations to write twenty-five new songs.

In Small Doses plays at 8:00 pm on Saturdays, November 2, 9 and 16; Sundays, November 3 and 10 at 2:00 pm and November 17 at 7:00 pm; and at 8:00 pm on Thursdays, November 7 and 14 at 8 pm. Tickets are \$12, general admission available. In Small Doses is presented in conjunction with the 1996 Jewish Book Festival.

## To be fully alive

Religious educators and Catholic school teachers from throughout Western Oregon will gather at Marist High School in Eugene for the Archdiocesan Catechetical Conference.

The Conference will take place on Friday, November 1, and Saturday, November 2, 1996, 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. each day.

The theme for this year's conference is "Life in Christ: To Be Fully Alive." The Keynote address will be given by Archbishop Francis E. George, O.M.I.

The conference is intended for Catholic school teachers, Directors of Religious Education and those working in the catechetical ministry: coordinators, teachers, board members, parents, and youth ministers, providing them with an opportunity for both personal faith enrichment and professional development. Nineteen workshops are

scheduled, and each will involve to presenters.

#### More signs of hope

Even amidst the turbulence of the cities--the lack of jobs, the increase of drugs, the ready availability of guns, the high rate of teenage pregnancy, the growing drop-out rate, the rising number of people with HIV and AIDS, the bankruptcy of urban school systems, the disproportionate number of toxic waste dumps, the number of abandoned home and factories, the high crime and the looming welfare repeal cuts--there are signs of hope. Often these signs of hope are faith based. Here are two such stories.

The Covenant Churches Association began when four Toledo pastors came together to tackle the problems of the city around them. These four pastors reached across denominational lines to work together for the healing of their community. Six months later they have started a credit union, a foster home and adoption program and have begun plans for programs to address the myriad problems faced by their congregation.

The vision of Rev. Robert Culp of First Church of God, Rev. Duane Tisdale of Friendship Baptist Church, Rev. Rudolph McKissick of United Missionary Baptist Church and Rev. Edward Cook of New Life Church of God in Christ includes arts, education, counseling and even street witnessing to restore the community to safety and cooperation.

Their joint work includes working with fathers, a voter education and community organization effort, economic empowerment programs together with African American businesses and consumers, a foster care and adoption program for African American children and a domestic violence and abuse counseling program

The Windsor Village United Methodist Church in Houston has taken a different approach to working with its community. Under the leadership of its pastor, Rev. Kirbyjon Caldwell, a former businessman and Wharton business school graduate, Windsor Village has developed a 104,000 square foot business center called the Power Center.

A former abandoned K-Mart store located near the church, the Power Center houses a bank branch, the Houston Community College which offers computer training and business classes, a federal nutrition program for women and infants, a health clinic, a pharmacy, a 1,900 seat banquet facility and a private grade school founded by the church. In addition, most of the office suites have been rented out to business-people.

Good things are happening in cities across the nation. We cannot give up hope and all of us must help nurture seeds.
