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The Music and the Man

Jelly Roll! The Music and the Man is the recipient of the Lucille Lortel Award for "Best Off-Broadway Musical" and the Outer Critics Circle Award for "Outstanding Off-Broadway Musical." The two-man show will appear at The Historic Elsinore Theatre Friday, March 21, 1997, 8:00 p.m.

Jelly Roll! is an expanded version of a wellknown nightclub revue that opened at a Manhattan Pub in 1992. The show offers a reminiscence of the music and life of legendary New Orleans post ragtime pianist and composer Jelly Roll Morton.

Originally created by Vernel Bagneris, the script is primarily based on interviews with "the father of jazz," which were recorded in 1938 and released in 1948. At the time of Morton's death, in 1941, a revival of New Orleans music was taking place.

Bringing this musical experience to life, are Kirk Taylor as Morton and Paul Asaro as The Professor and accompanist. The highly talented duo work together weaving music, tales and dance to re-create episodes from the life of Morton in what Newsday calls "a syncopated jewel of show.


