Sean Waller Named Benson Football Coach

ook out Portland Interscholastic League! The blitz is coming back to Benson High School, with the selection of former Techman star Sean Waller as the new head football coach.

Waller is taking over the position held by his former coach Bill Dressell, who directed the Techmen for 21 years, retiring in November as one of the top 10 winningest coaches in Oregon.

"I was a linebacker and utility offensive player for him in 1980-81," Waller told The Portland Observer, recalling earning the most valuable player award in his senior years and making second team all state and all league in his junior and senior years.

Now, at 33, Waller wants to continue the Dressell tradition of hard hitting team players, both on and off the field. "I want to bring back excitement to Benson football and fill the stands."

"Our kids are performing to the best of their ability in the classroom and social environment as well as on the field," said Waller

Last year the Techmen went 7 and 3, taking second in the league, bowing to the champs at Grant.

"Benson won the state championship in 1988, the first PIL team to win it in the 80s,"

he said. "I wasn't part of that staff."

"Benson is known for running a five two
defense," said Waller, "but I'm a pressure
person, and we'll do more blitzing to create
turnovers with a more aggressive 4-2-3 de-

fense to reflect my personality.

"When I went to school we were known for our Orange Crush defense, only giving up seven points a game. We are going back to that era, shutting everyone down and scoring points."

Waller said he will build a Techmen defense around line-backer Bill Fairly, defensive end Greg Lewallen and lineman Brent McAllister.

On offense, he plans to transform Benson's traditional I-formation into "a multiple formation offense with a west coast attitude, spreading the field both horizontally and vertically with more short passing to the backs."

"Speed kills" will be the theme, he said. "I have five speedsters, all fast, skilled position players that can catch and run."

Waller mentioned Antjuan Tolbert, Benson's leading receiver; Devon Saahir, a 100 yards per game rusher; Jimi Henderson, "Our best possession receiver", Ryan Sharp, who is moving up from the Jv program; and his own son JR Waller, last year's leading scorer who runs the 40 in 4.2 seconds.

Emphasizing "bigger and stronger," Waller envisions his players spending a lot of time in the weight room.

"I'm going to build community, increasing avenues for parents to get involved with a booster club," said Waller.

He red shirted at Linfield College, but a car accident stopped him cold, and he went into coaching. Last year his freshman program went 4-2 in league play, with a 4-4 overall. He has coached 11 years, including two sixth grade teams in Dayton and Oregon

Waller has been on the gridiron since age eight as a Pop Warner team player in Los Angeles.

"My mother has never seen me play, because of the violence in the sport, but she always asked about it."

At 12, he moved to Portland to live with his father, who "pulled me out of the program in the middle of the eighth grade because of my grades. That impacted how I raise my two children and athletes not earning at least a 2.3 grade point average must sign a contract before being allowed to continue in football."

en Portland Public Schools' elementary and middle school prin cipals met yesterday at the Portland Public School District administration offices to receive AT&T Safe Schools phone training. The AT&T Safe Schools program provides schools nationwide access to digital wireless phones and free local airtime. Of the 1,000 schools across the United States that were awarded AT&T Safe School grants, fifty-two went to schools in Oregon and Southwest Washington, and ten of those were issued to Portland Public Schools. Awards were based on the school's level of need, the school meeting the defined limits of the program, and the availability of AT&T Wireless Service in the local area.

Principals participated in a training seminar with AT&T Wireless Services and Ericsson Mobile Phones to receive their phones and learn how to use them to assist their school's particular safety issues. Each school received two digital wireless phones and unlimited minutes of local airtime from AT&T Wireless Services.

The Portland Public School District is one of five school districts in Oregon and South-

west Washington selected to participate in the AT&T Safe Schools program. The program is designed to improve the learning atmosphere for students by increasing safety on and around school campuses.

"The AT&T Safe Schools program will allow us to stay in communication with faculty at all times, especially during playground time," said Allison Couch, principal at Claredon Elementary in North Portland. "We have several students who have severe allergic reactions to bee stings. These phones will be beneficial to have quick contact with the office if the students were outside."

Grant recipients include Arleta Elementary, Capitol Hill Elementary, Chief Joseph Elementary, Claredon Elementary, William Clark Elementary, George Middle School, James John Elementary, Kenton Elementary, Metropolitan Learning Center and Skyline.

"Our school is part of the Urban Ecology Program with Portland State University where studies are held off school grounds," said David Masunaga, principal at George Middle School in North Portland. "These phones will allow our students who participate in these environmental studies quick access to the school in case of emergencies."

"With school budget cuts and lack of phone lines, this program provides the quick, vital communications necessary at schools in a safety situation," said Lew Frederick, Portland Public Schools' Director of Public Information. "The AT&T Safe School program will play a great role in school security so that our children can study and learn in a safer environment."
