Jones Dismissal Leaves Unpaid Bills

Out \$800,000 in legal fees, Paula Jones' former attorneys joke about putting their photo on milk cartons with a fund-raising plea: "Can you help these two?" But there was little for Mrs. Jones to laugh at as the financial consequences of her losing legal battle with President Clinton became clear. Mrs. Jones, who turned down a \$700,000 settlement offer last fall, was counting on a hefty court judgment - or even bigger cash settlement - to pay off at least \$2 million in legal bills. A judge's decision dismissing the suit all but ruled out her chances of seeing any cash. A spokeswoman said Thursday she would push Mrs. Jones to consider a book or movie deal.

Jesse Jackson Calls On Justice Department

The Rev. Jesse Jackson has called on the Justice Department to investigate whether the government played a role in the death of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. "Our government was actively involved in destroying Martin Luther King Jr. Now, did they do it directly or were they a part of hiring someone, we don't know," Jackson said on NBC's "Meet the Press." Jackson, whose comments came after the 30th anniversary of King's death, said he thinks convicted assassin James Earl Ray was not solely responsible.

Dow ends above 9000

The Dow closed above 9000 points for the first time on Monday, saved from a fall by the \$80 billion merger of the Travelers Group Inc. and Citicorp, the biggest in corporate history. The deal sparked a buying frenzy in financial stocks. The Dow ended unofficially up 49.82 points at 9033.23, a record. "If you are in the financials and you are hoping for a takeover, you buy. If you are anywhere else, you lighten up a little bit." The broader market S&P500 index ended off 1.31 points at 1121.39. Advancing issues trailed decliners by 12 to 17 on volume of 627 million shares.

King's Family Urges New Commission

Thirty years after Martin Luther King Jr.'s death, his family wants President Clinton to establish a national commission to investigate the assassination. King's widow, Coretta Scott King, called for a panel similar to South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission that would provide immunity for anyone with information about the crime. King's family has been pushing for a new trial for James Earl Ray, who is serving a 99-year prison term for the slaying. They say they are not convinced he acted alone or committed the crime at all.

Report: Folic Acid Aids Pregnancies

Any woman who might become pregnant should either eat specially fortified foods or take a vitamin supplement of folic acid every day to protect against birth defects, a panel of experts said. Also, all Americans over age 50 should eat a bowl of fortified cereal every day or take a supplement of Vitamin B12, a nutrient important for making blood cells but one that declines with age, said the Institute of Medicine report.

Water Found on Saturn's Moon ION

Europe's infrared space observatory has discovered water in many unexpected places - including a moon of Saturn - raising expectations of life elsewhere in the universe, the European Space Agency said. The discovery of water vapor in the atmosphere of Titan, Saturn's largest moon, may indicate that conditions there duplicate those that gave birth to life on Earth, the agency's director of science said.
