### Oregon Farmworker Union Signs First Contract

"We will win more contracts and have PCUN as our union," asserted Job Pozos Jr. on Cesar Chavez Day, Tuesday, March 31st. He spoke as a member of the negotiating committee as the Oregon farmworker union, Pineros y Campesinos Unidos del Noroeste (PCNN, which is translated as Northwest Treeplanters and Farmworkers United) and an organic grower signed the first collective bargaining agreement in the history of Oregon agriculture. This is only the second collective bargaining agreement between farmworkers and growers to be signed in the Pacific Northwest.

Workers representing the committee which negotiated the terms of the contract signed the two-year binding agreement along with Ramon Ramirez, the President of PCUN, and Scott Frost of Nature's Fountain Farm, a transitional 26-acre organic farm.

Ramon Ramirez, the President of Pineros y Campesinos Unidos del Noroeste, eloquently stated; "When we embarked on this work over twenty years ago, we knew it would be long and difficult. Many of the rights and protections enjoyed by working people in this country are not afforded to the farmworkers.





Growers have resisted our efforts to bring about fair treatment and justice in the fields. In order to make collective bargaining a reality we have had to take our struggle to the fields, to the courts, to the legislature, to the media, to people of conscience, and lastly to the consumer."

Juanita Cox-Valdez, Director of the United Farm Workers of America, AFL-CIO' Centro 16 de septiembre in Texas, read a statement from UFW President Arturo Rodriguez which said, "PCUN's determined efforts mirror the UFW's 36-year struggle to bring a measure of dig-

nity and security for farm workers in our country. Announcement of this first collective bargaining agreement in Oregon is a milestone for both of our unions. We rejoice with our sisters and brothers in PCUN. Their victory is also our own."

Senator Ron Wyden, in a written statement of support, echoed the sentiments of the UFW. "In the future, I expect we will look back on today's agreement as a key moment from which both workers and growers began to progress toward a cooperative atmosphere to the benefit of themselves and indeed all of Oregon.

#### Hosting Opportunities in the Portland metro area

#### Oregon Auto Insurance Rates Remain Well Below U.S. Average

Only 16 states had lower auto insurance premiums than Oregon in 1996.

According to the recent comparison released by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC), the sixmonth combined average automobile insurance premium (includes liability, collision and comprehensive coverages) in Oregon for 1996 was \$660.76 versus the countrywide average of \$774.12.

"The 11.7 percent rise in auto crashes in Oregon in 1996 was tempered by the 12.5 percent rise in registered vehicles and the 11 percent rise in licensed drivers," says Marianne Macina, CPCU, regional manager for the Western Insurance Information Service (WIIS). "As the population growth levels off, we need to keep the number of automobile crashes down if we want to contain the rising cost of insurance."

"The automobile insurance industry in the U.S. has one of the lowest returns on equity (ROE) when compared with other profit making industries - only a six percent ROE in 1996," says Macina.
