

Tour Departs For Nation's Historically Black Colleges And Universities

The Urban League of Portland, Self Enhancement, Inc., Bridge Builders, I Have a Dream Foundation, Multnomah County's Department of Juvenile and Adult Community Justice and the Northeast Community Development Corporation teamed up last week to send a group of 31 young people on a whirlwind tour of 17 Historically Black Colleges and Universities nationwide.

The idea originated as an adjunct, to the visit by the diversion school, of our correctional facilities and the need to create the positive alternative experience as well. The Program is called the "Next Step."

The tour includes visits to Morgan, Coppin State, Howard University, Hampton University, Norfolk State, Virginia State, St. Augustine, Shaw University, Carolina Central University, Carolina A&T, Livingston College, Benedict College, South Carolina State, Moorhouse College, Spellman College, Clark Atlanta University, and Virginia Union where students will meet with Douglas Wilder, former Governor of the state of Virginia and the nation's first elected black governor.
