

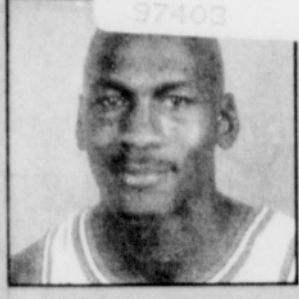

## THE WEEK IN REVIEW

### Nuclear Tests

India admitted to conducting three underground nuclear tests which had touched off a strategic arms race with Pakistan. The United States had responded by threatening India with economic sanctions. The device tested included a thermonuclear device, commonly known as a hydrogen bomb.

### Nike Factories

Nike Chairman Phil Knight announced that his company is taking steps to improve working conditions in Asian factories. Knight pledged that factory improvements will consist of raising air-quality standards, increasing independent monitoring of factories and raising the minimum wage.

### Windows 98

A federal appeals court ruled that antitrust restrictions on the sale of Microsoft's Windows software do not extend to the company's upcoming release of Windows 98. Microsoft can now ship its updated Windows software to computer-makers this week and require them to include the company's Internet browser. Another antitrust complaint by the Justice Department could interfere with that shipment.

### Women's Health

The Oregon Health Sciences University will soon have an extended facility call the Center for Women's Health. It will open in 15 months. Many supporters are anxiously anticipating this new health center which would integrate outpatient clinical care, research and education services.

### Turmoil In Indonesia

Rioters (mostly poor young Indonesians) had rampaged through Jakarta, setting afire cars, shops and houses. They targeted businesses owned by ethnic Chinese and members of the ruling family. The government responded by having tanks and 10,000 troops deployed around the city.

### Powerball Jackpot

Powerball, Oregon's nationwide lottery jackpot reached a record high of \$110 million. State lottery officials are running television ads urging players to use caution and be responsible when spending their money. Their recurring theme to the public is 'Play Your Dollars With Sense.'

### Frank Sinatra Dies

Frank Sinatra had died recently of a heart attack in the emergency room of Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles. Rail-thin crooner, egomaniacal fistfighter, swoony balladeer, haughty playboy, dashing swain, ruthless careerist, doting father - Frank Sinatra was all of these and more.

### Herceptin

A new prescription called Herceptin is the first to succeed in attacking breast cancer in the lives of some terminally ill patients. It thwarts the defective genes causing their disease. Herceptin attacks the cancer at its genetic roots, a goal of science for two decades.

### Macdonald Center

The Macdonald Center plans to start construction this summer on a \$6 million, four-story, assisted-living home for 54 people. The home will allow the center to care for frail residents who are also chronically mentally ill and have addictions, other disabilities or terminal diseases.
