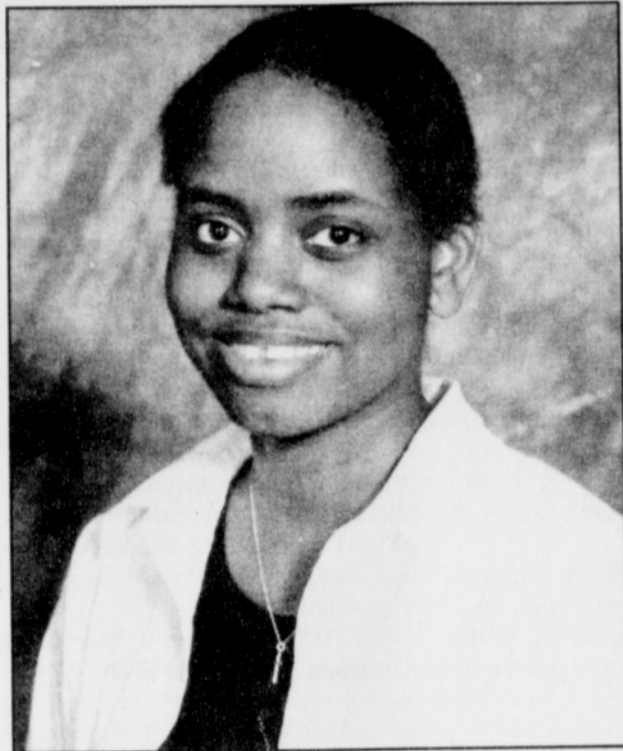
Portland Youth To Receive \$4,000 Scholarship For College

Kelva Johnson, a senior at U.S. Grant High School in Portland, is one of 153 high school seniors from across the U.S. who has been honored by the Coca-Cola Bottlers and The Coca-Cola Company to receive a scholarship for college.

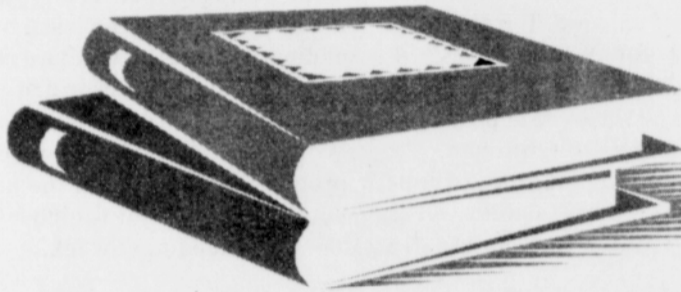
She joined 152 other high school seniors April 23-26 at the Coca-Cola Scholars National Competition in Atlanta.

Black College Students Answer The Call To Service

Last month the former Alex Haley Farm in Tennessee, more than 290 African American college students and college-age adults from the Children Defense Fund's Black Community Crusade for Children (BCCC) completed a rigorous two-week training program that prepared them to serve low-income children at 33 Freedom Schools in 12 states and the District of Columbia this summer.

At an inspiring graduation ceremony, Mayersville, Mississippi Mayor Unita Blackwell shared stories of the early days of the Civil Rights Movement to inspire and sustain these young student leaders of the new movement for children.

Our Black youths are answering the call. The crisis children face in communities all over this country demands immediate action, not talk. I'm so grateful that these young people are inspired and motivated by the same sense of purpose that I felt as a college student in 1960 to work to reclaim our communities and our children.

In those early days in the Civil

Rights Movement, the support we got from each other gave us the courage to carry us through harrowing days. The bonds we made then have endured a lifetime as we have gone on, each in our own way, trying to make a difference. Last month as these young people from the Student Leadership Network for Children worked and learned and dreamed of a new order together, bonds were forged and hopes were strengthened. They left the Haley farm ready to make a positive difference in the lives of 2,300 children this summer and beyond, and, as the Bible says, "the number of disciples multiplied greatly."

Freedom School training teaches young college-age leaders to help children by combining feeding programs with cultural and education enrichment, as well as recreation, advocacy, and conflict management. Parents must attend weekly seminars and are involved in their children's progress. The adult sponsors and college-age interns graduated from Freedom School training through the Ella Baker Child Policy Training Institute, held

this year at the University of Tennessee and at the former Alex Haley Farm in Tennessee, which is the spiritual home for the BCCC and CDF's center for intergenerational leadership development.

Founded in 1992 in honor of Ms. Ella Baker, who was an inspiration to thousands of young people like me in the Civil Rights Movement, the Ella Baker Child Policy Training Institute continues her legacy in our new movement for children through the work of this generation of young servant leaders.

Freedom Schools unite parents, young adults, and community leaders around the common goal of giving children a safe and positive educational summer experience. Like the Mississippi Freedom Schools of 1964, they tap into and strengthen the Black community tradition of self-help and rebuild the bridges between the generations. They feed hungry children (most sites serve meals provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Summer Food Service Program), nurture learning starved minds, and bring light to spiritually damaged lives. For

many children, Freedom Schools provide safe havens in dangerous neighborhoods, as well as the mentors and positive role models of Black college students. We all love Michael Jordan, but the role model our children need is someone who grew up near them, who went off to college, and came back home to give back. The college students running Freedom Schools serve children ages 5-18 for 6-8 weeks, integrating reading, violence prevention, chess, and social action in an activity based curriculum that promotes social, cultural and historical awareness.

In Freedom Schools this summer, young children will exchange letters with new pen pals in Freedom Schools in other states and begin to forge bonds of hope and commitment for yet another generation.

Reaching across the country, the network of those pledged to build a world safe for children expands, and the BCCC continues to weave and reweave the rich fabric of community that historically has been the cornerstone for the healthy development of Black children.

Robert W. Franz Cancer Research Center Becomes the Classroom For Grant Recipient Pursuing Medicine

While most high school graduates spend the carefree summer months at odd jobs, 17 year old Kimberly McClain will be working side by side with the nationally known research team at the Robert W. Franz Cancer Research Center. The Grant High School valedictorian has been selected as the second recipient of the Karen Bender McCuen Memorial Future Scholars Fund. The fund was established by family and friends of Bender who died of melanoma at Providence Portland Medical Center in October 1996.

Each year, a Portland area high school student with an interest in science and biology is selected to spend the summer working with researchers and physicians, exploring science in a laboratory setting at the Franz Cancer Research Center. McClain will have the rare opportunity to learn about the science of immunotherapy—a focus of the Franz research team. Scientists are engaging the body's immune system to seek and destroy cancerous tumors.

"I'm actually able to do some of the things I've only read about in books," says McClain, who is performing basic laboratory functions under the direction of Bernie Fox, Ph.D., chief, Laboratory of Molecular and Tumor Immunology.

McClain was selected by representatives of the Franz Cancer Research Center, Providence Portland Medical Foundation and Grant high School Institute for Science and Mathematics. At Grant she was president of the National Honor Society, captain of the dance team and a member of the Grant High School Royal Blues Choir.

McClain plans to attend the University of Washington in the fall in hopes of becoming a doctor.

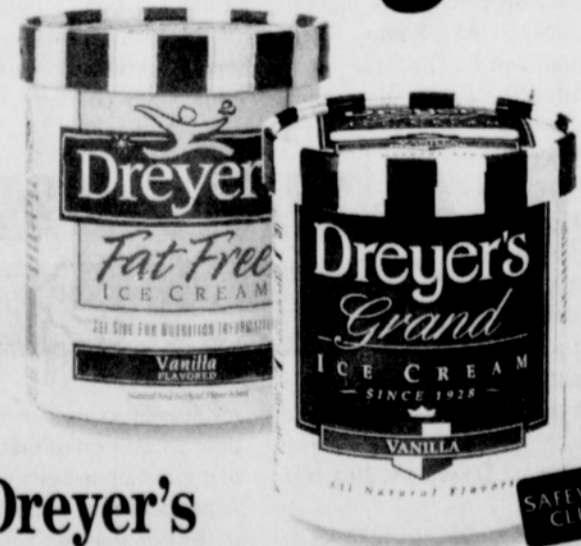

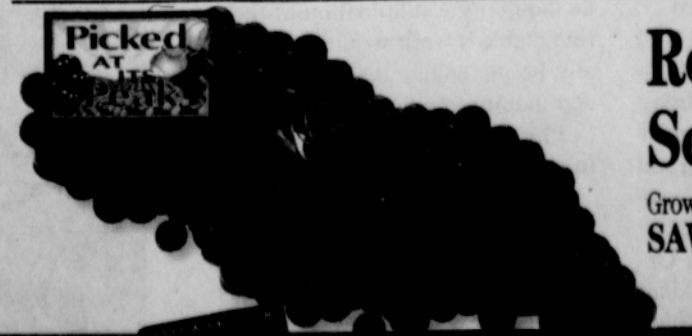
