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THE WEEK IN REVIEW

Swissair Crash

A Swissair jet (Flight 111) that was bound for Geneva crashed into the ocean off Nova Scotia killing 229 people. There were 136 American victims involved with no evidence of survivors. Reports told of smoke in the cockpit and the three-engine plane dumped tons of fuel while the jet was trying to make an emergency landing.

Russian Prime Minister

President Boris Yeltsin was urged by the Communist-led parliament to choose a new prime minister besides Viktor Chernomyrdin. If Parliament rejects a candidate three times, the president must dissolve the panel and call for new elections. The Russian currency continues to fall. The current value is 13.5 rubles to the dollar.

Rwandan Prime Minister

Jean Kambanda, Rwandan Prime Minister was sentenced to life imprisonment by a U.N. tribunal for slaughtering more than 50,000 Rwandans in 1994. The Prime Minister pleaded guilty to six counts of genocide and crimes against humanity, including responsibility for the murder and extermination of civilians.

Hurricane Earl

Tropical storm Earl turned into a hurricane which headed for the Gulf Coast at winds of 80 mph. The storm affected Texas and Louisiana earlier. Hurricane warnings were issued from Mississippi to northern Florida.

Back To School

There are 52.7 million children who are enrolled in public and private schools this Fall which is a new record. Nationally and in Oregon, there will be more of an emphasis on higher academic standards and tougher measures to protect the safety of children from school violence. President Clinton is urging Congress to accept his plan for modernizing schools, offering federal tax cuts to finance repairs of older school buildings and hiring 100,000 more teachers.

Goodbye Keiko

Keiko is expected to leave Newport this week to live in a bay pen off Iceland's coast. Many fans had bid him farewell. The whale boosted the town economically since 1996 and officials at the Oregon Coast Aquarium are expecting attendance to increase again with a new attraction called "Open Ocean" that would replace Keiko as the main attraction once he leaves.

John Lim

Gresham State Senator John Lim will challenge Senator Ron Wyden in the November elections. He is seeking support from Korean American communities. Lim must do well in east Multnomah County and win Oregon's rural vote to beat Wyden.

Tigard's Water Supply

Tigard is interested in drawing from the Willamette River for its long-term water supply. The city is facing a serious water shortage, consuming an average of 13 million gallons daily this summer. Tigard has no water source of its own and purchases 60 percent of its water from Portland on a contract that expires in 2007.

For the second year in a row, the Portland Power continued their community outreach by working on a Habitat for Humanity house.

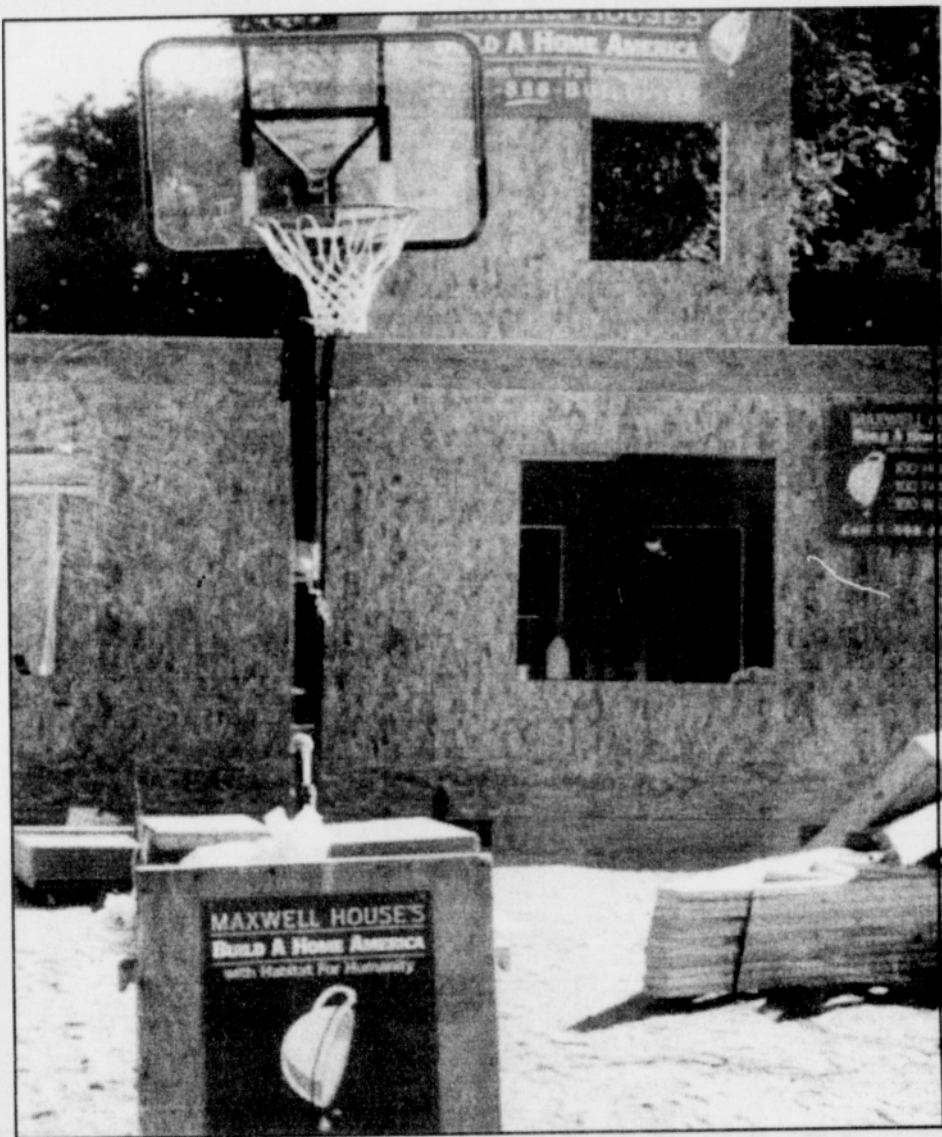

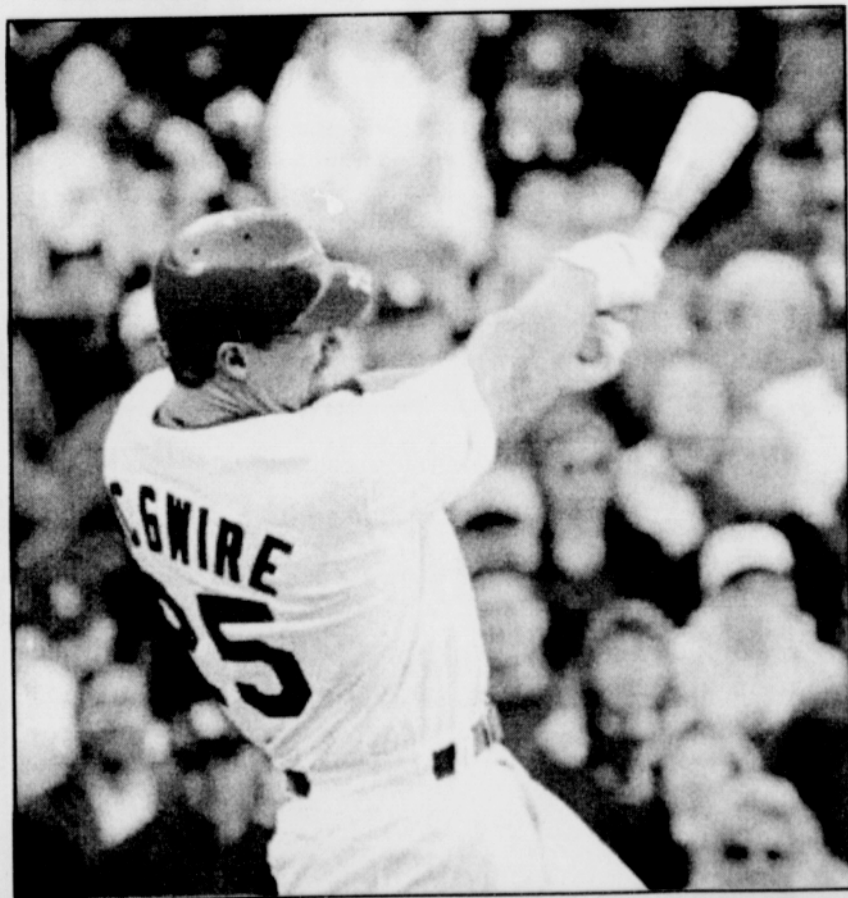
tat for Humanity, and Candlelighters.

McGwire tops the 37-year-old record of 61 set by Roger Maris in 1961. Chicago Cubs pitcher Steve Trachsel goes into the trivia books as the pitcher who served up the record homer.

As he did after his 61st homer,

McGwire hugged his son after crossing home plate and gave hugs and high-fives to his teammates.

Chicago Cubs slugger Sammy Sosa also greeted McGwire behind home plate after the record homer. Sosa is four homers behind McGwire's record.

McGwire later leaped into the stands to hug the Maris family, which was sitting near the St. Louis Cardinals dugout.
