Multnomah County Elections

The Multnomah County Elections Office will be open on Saturday, October 31st from 9 AM to 1 PM. The Elections Office is located at 1040 SE. Morrison Street.

Beginning Sunday, November 1st, "Voter Express" ballot drop sites will be available for last-minute absentee voters to drop off their ballot for the November 3rd General election.

The "Voter Express" absentee ballot drop sites will be open ONLY on:

Sunday - November 1st Noon - 5 PM
Monday - November 2nd 8 AM - 6 PM
Tuesday - November 3rd 8 AM - 8 PM

Plaza 205 (SE. 105th & Washington: In Parking Lot)

Absentee ballots can be dropped off anytime at the Elections Office, 1040 SE Morrison Street, up to 8 PM, November 3rd. A mail slot in the door is available after hours and on weekends!

In all cases, NO ABSENTEE BALLOT WILL BE ACCEPTED after 8 PM on Tuesday, November 3rd. POSTMARKS DO NOT COUNT.

Political Signs Not Allowed

The Oregon Department of Transportation reminds political candidates that temporary political signs are not permitted on nor may they be installed from the state highway right-of-way. They are also prohibited from being posted on trees, utility poles, right-of-way fence posts, and in protected areas of the interstate system, designated scenic areas, or park lands.

Any temporary political signs located on state highway right-of-way may be removed without notice.

Oregon law also states that all temporary political signs must be removed 30 days after the election date.

Forty - Four Percent of Voters Request Absentee Ballots

The November 3rd general election is a polling place election, however, more than 866,166 of Oregon's roughly 1,958,000 million registered voters - about 44% have already requested to receive their ballot by mail.

"Eighty thousands additional voters have requested to vote by absentee ballot since the May 19 primary election," said Secretary of State Phil Keisling. "This November, we are likely to have a situation similar to the 1998 primary in which more votes were cast by absentee voters than by those who went to the polls." During the 1998 primary election, absentee voters ac-

counted for 63 percent of all ballots cast.

Absentee registration as a percentage of total registration ranges from a high of 70 percent in Wasco County to a low of 18 percent in Umatilla County. Most county clerks expect absentee registration to increase between now and Election Day. "We're processing hundreds of new absentee ballot requests every week," said Lane County Elections Manager Annette Newingham.

Those already registered to vote in the November 3rd election may request an absentee ballot any time before Election Day. Ballots will not be mailed after Oc-

tober 29th, however. If voters decide to request an absentee ballot after that date, they must pick up the ballot at their county elections office.

Beginning tomorrow, daily absentee ballot return figures by county will be available on the Secretary of State's web site. The information will be updated by noon each day to include ballot return figures for the previous day. The ballot return figures will be available through the state Elections Division web page at <http://www.sos.state.or.us>.

County election officials must receive absentee ballots by 8 PM on November 3rd. On Election Day, voters also may hand-deliver their voted ballot to any county
