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The Portland Black Catholic Lay Caucus

The present Portland Black Catholic Lay Caucus (PBCLC) was formed in July 1976. This was actually the second attempt at forming a Black Caucus in Portland. A few years earlier in the late sixties an attempt had failed. As I recall, Bill and Gladys McCoy were active in the earlier group. Some meetings were held at the Albina Art Center.

This was the time of the Civil Rights Movement in this country, and African Americans were struggling and pushing for their rights everywhere

So it was only natural that the American Roman Catholic Church not be exempt from the desire of Black people to be recognized, accepted and supported by the church. That is the reason that the National Office of Black Catholics (NOBC) was formed in 1970 with it's headquarters in Washington, D.C. the three groups that supported and actively participated in the NOBC were the National Black Clergy Caucus (NBCC), the National Black Sisters Conference (NBSC), and the National Black Lay Catholic Caucus (NBLCC).

Fr. Bert Griffin of St. Andrew Parish provided the impetus and the encouragement for the eventual formation of the current caucus. In 1974, he provided the means for Harold and Barbara Sibley and myself to attend a conference of NBLCC in San Diego, CA. Then in 1976 a much larger group of ten (10) Black Catholics attended the NBLCC conference in Seattle, WA. The Attendees were from Immaculate Heart and St. Andrew parishes.

By this time, our enthusiasm was so great that we decided that we just had to have a Black Catholic Caucus here in Portland, OR. The primary purpose of the Portland Black Catholic Lay Caucus is to coordinate the activities of Black Catholics and other individuals in all areas of the Catholic Church in the Church environment. We also attempt to provide direction and guidelines to the American Catholic Bishops in the fight against racism; train and sensitize White clergy and plan and develop programs and strategies that affect the Black community.

In 1980 we sponsored five (5) representatives to the First National Conference of NBLCC in Chicago, Il. In 1981, we were privileged to host the Western Regional Confer-

ence of NOBC.

PBCLC has never been a fund raising organization. Our funds have primarily been provided by the Archdiocese of Portland. In the beginning, we received a percentage of the annual NOBC sponsored Black Catholics Concerned (BCC) collection, which was discontinued. When the BCC collection was stopped, the Archdiocese began giving the PBCLC yearly grants of about \$3,000. In 1987, during Archbishop Levada's tenure, we began to receive extra funds to send delegates to the Black Catholic Congress, which takes place every five (5) years.

The PBCLC has been officially recognized as a diocesan lay organization for twenty-two (22) years and is listed in the Archdiocesan Catholic Directory. The following members of the Caucus have been active for most of those years. Teletha Benjamin, Francisca Gabriel, Edna Hicks, Patricia Ryan, Sr. Kathleen Stupfel, Mary Paris and Lavern Watson. We have had five (5) PBCLC presidents since 1976. They are Sam Jackson, Jr., Gail Washington-Johnson, Geraldine Chelsey-Mitchell, Lucinda Tate and Louis Boston.

Father Smith is a member of the Society of the Divine Word, an international religious order working in sixty-five countries worldwide. Father Smith was ordained in 1988 in Chicago along with his twin brother (Father Charles A. Smith, Jr.), making African American history by becoming the first African twin priests to be ordained in the Roman Catholic Church here in America.

Father Smith has served in pastoral, education, retreat and revival ministries. A major focus of his ministry is African American youth development. He is founder of Ambassadors of the Word, a peer group ministry program that has taken African American youth to West Africa, Caribbean Islands, Belize (Central America), Brazil and Trinidad.

Father Smith is also a member of the Bowman-Francis Ministry Project. The project produces culturally relevant educational materials, fosters cross cultural awareness, and promotes afrocentric approaches to the challenges and problems facing the African American family and community.

Father Smith has worked as an organizational consultant and trainer with numerous community non-profit business organizations and city agencies.

Father Smith, is the co-author of Boyhood to Manhood, a rite of passage manual for African American boys (1993) and a manual for the African American family Kwanzaa celebration: My Family Our Family (1995).

Father Smith lectures nationally. He has made numerous conferences and media presentations on the use of the adolescent rites, and he participates with rites groups around the country.
