

Take 6 Mark Tenth Anniversary with a Return to Cappella Roots on "So Cool"

With Seven Grammy Awards Already To Their Credit, The October 27th Release of "So Cool" Finds The World's Most Heralded Gospel/Pop Crossover Artists Reaffirming Their Place As The Leading Voices of American A Cappella

"A cappella's Cool!" - With the opening line of their sixth album, SO COOl, gospel ambassadors TAKE 6 (Alvin Chea, Cedric Dent, Joey Kibble, Mark Kibble, Claude McKnight and David Thomas) affirm that they have come home to a cappella.

In a career that has seen five gold & platinum albums, seven Grammy Awards (out of fifteen nominations), eight Dove Awards, and the group topping Downbeat Magazine's readers & critics' poll as "Best Jazz Vocal Group" for an amazing seven consecutive years, Take 6 has decided to mark the tenth anniversary of the group's recording debut by returning to their a cappella roots. "Singing a cappella is a wonderful intimate form of music, and we knew we had not yet explored all of its possibilities. We decided to go back down that road to see what more we could do," explains Chea. Highlighting the legendary synthesis of doo-wop, gospel, jazz and R&B that has won Take 6 fans across the world, So Cool (set for release October 27th by Warner/Reprise) further incorporates an electric array of styles that include swing, cool jazz, pop and even South African chorale. All these elements are grounded in the abiding faith in God that runs throughout Take 6's lush a cappella harmonies.

However, while Take 6 is revisiting their roots, they are also exploring new terrain with an eye

to the future. The group will be making their on-screen feature film debut in Steve Martin and Goldie Hawn's upcoming release, "The Out-of-Towners". In addition, the group will appear on the companion album Dreamworks' "Prince of Egypt", and has filmed as PSA entitled "We're All in This Together" for the NFL & United Way that will air throughout the fall football season.

Now that they have reached the ten-year mark, Take 6's philosophy on their enduring success can best be summed up in their new motto. "Some people would call it a great career... We call it a good beginning!"
