The darkest fear of any athlete surfaced Sunday at the Phoenix Open, a vulnerability that can be exposed by any fruitcake with a pistol. It evoked memories of Monica Seles, once stabbed in the back during a changeover in Germany, the target of a crazy fan looking to help out Steffi Graf. It was reminiscent of the lunatic from Cleveland who drove to Florida in search of slugger Albert Belle, who had left the Indians and signed with the White Sox.

And suddenly the Thunderbirds have a new problem:

Metal detectors under the bridge? A complete ban on alcohol sales? Bulletproof vests for the golfers? A tournament without fans? Of course, we are making no assumptions, no accusations of grassy knolls or assassination plots. The man arrested, Brian K. Murphy of Phoenix, had a permit for his firearm, making its pres-

"I still get them," Woods said with remarkable calm. This is not the first time a fan with a firearm has been arrested in the vicinity of Woods. It happened in Dallas five or six years ago, when Woods was an amateur playing a practice round by himself. Two women were arrested with guns in their backpacks, on their way to where Woods was practicing. Some day, the rough edges of society will get a clue.

"There are definitely some crazy people out there," Payne Stewart said. "And there is a black and white issue out there. It's sad, but it's the way it is. As I understand it, Tiger has had some death threats before, which is why he has so many security guards."

"I don't know," he said. "We'll see."

So long, Tiger. And the Phoenix Open as we know it.

Sheppard Named Quarterbacks Coach

KIRKLAND, WA-The Seattle Seahawks named Mike Sheppard the teams quarterbacks coach, Monday

Sheppard, who will be in his seventh NFL season in 1999, joins the Seahawks following two seasons as the San Diego Chargers' offensive coordinator/wide receiver's coach.

"I'veknownMike for a long time, dating back to BYU," saidExecutive Vice President of Football Operations/General Manager & Head Coach Mike Holmgren. "He brings a tremendous amount of passinggame expertise to the table and I feel extremely fortunate to add him to our staff here in Seattle."

Prior to his stint with the Chargers, Sheppard served as the Baltimore Raven's wide receivers coach in 1996. Hespent five years (1987-91) as the head coach at the University of New Mexico. He was also the head coach at Long Beach State from 1984-86.

Sheppards other coaching stops include Kansas (1983) as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach, Long Beach State (1982) as quarterbacks coach, Idaho State (1980-81) as quarterbacks and receivers coach, U.S. International (1979) as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks, Brigham Young (1977-78) as a graduate assistant and Cal Lutheran (1974-76) as receivers coach.

Sheppard, 47, graduated from Cal Lutheran, with a bachelor's degree in business, where he was a twosport star in football and baseball.
