LANGSTON HUGHES

Langston Hughes is one of America's Literary Treasures, a crown jewel of the Harlem Renaissance, and a creative genius. For more than forty years, he demonstrated a prodigious talent succeeding equally in poetry, fiction, autobiography, journalism, drama, essay, translation, and works for children. Born in Joplin, Missouri, Fen. 1, 1902, Hughes spent his early years with his grandmother. Later, he and his mother moved throughout the Midwest settling in Cleveland where he graduated from high school.

He spent two years in Mexico with his father before entering Columbia University in 1921. He quit after a year and began a four year journey around the world. Hughes wrote his first poems in high school and published his first major poem, "The Negro Speaks of Rivers" in The Crisis magazine in 1952. That year he entered Lincoln University in Pennsylvania where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree. He continued to write for The Crisis, and in 1962, published his first volume of poems, The Weary Blues.

He published his first novel, Without Laughter, in 1930 and The Ways of White Folks, a collection of short stories, in 1934. His first efforts in theater, the 1935 production of Mulaffo, ran for a year on Broadway. Hughes' writing was influenced by his grandmother's tales of the self reliance of his forebears, the connection he felt when he first went to Africa, and the late-night boyhood realization that he wanted to write stories about "Negroes - true that people in faraway lands would read them- even after I was dead." His work is infused with rhythms of jazz and blues, and is rich with black folk culture. He spoke in the generation of powerful and explosive cultural and political awareness of African-Americans. It was with fierce pride that he considered himself not just an artist but a "Negro Artist".

Hughes remained active until his death in 1967. Traveling, writing, lecturing, he settled in Harlem and for 20 years wrote a column based on his folk character Jesse B. Sempler or "Simple" - the black everyman whose observations combine mother wit,

cynicism, naivete', and insight. The simple columns were collected into five volumes and are considered the best of his literary accomplishments.

FLOONEY

The founder of the Theater Company, Flooney (his full name) worked in theaterin Portland from 1968 through 1979 before going East to study African-American culture at Morgan State University in Baltimore.

He acquired a Bachelor of Arts degree in African-American History and continued his education pursuing a graduate degree through the African Studies and Research Center at Cornell University. There he met and studied under such literary masters of African American literature such as James Baldwin, Amiri Baraka, Sonia Sanchez, Gwendolyn Brooks, and many

He went on to recieve his Teacher's Certificate from the

Cortland. After twenty-five years, Flooney decided to bring his two loves, theater and African culture, together and formed Flooney's Thearter Company, committed to bringing attention to Arican-American playwrights and to give African-American actors an apportunity for Northwest audiences to experience the bountiful contributions of African-Americans through education and entertainment.

Flooney has been seen as Rambone in Two Trains Running; as Jack in Death of Bessie Smith (Slaptown); Romeo's father in Romeo and Juliet; Richard II (Portland Shakespeare); Williams in One Flew Over the Cuckoos Nest (Slaptown); Clay Williams in The Dutchman; Old Man in Wine in the Wilderness (Portland Black Repertory theatre); George in Grapes of Wrath; and Simple in the Langston Hughes Project State University of New York at (Flooney's Theater Co.)
