STEVE WILSON

When The New York Times decided to do a feature article on "A Sideman's Life," they wisely called on one of the Big Apple's a most in-demand musician saxophonist Stve Wilson. As a veteran of various jazz ensembles led by Chick Corea, Lionel Hampton, Dave Holland, Buster Williams, Mulgrew Miller, Leon Parker, and Michele Rosewoman, Wilson was the perfect choice: "the quintessential sideman," wrote The Times.

Time for The Times to update their story. Wilson has broken out from the sideman's role, showcasing his performance and compositional skills as a leader in his own right with "Generations," - CCD-9019-2 his debut disc for Corea's two -year-old Stretch Records.

"Being a sideman is so many different groups has allowed me to observe and absord what it takes to be a leader," explains Wilson as he talks about moving from sideman to main man. "As a leader, you have to be responsible not just for yourself and your own musical abilities, but for the other musicians as well.

A Hampton, Virgina native, Wilson began his formal training as a musician at the age o f12, and started performing with local R&B funk bands through his teenage years. Moving from oboe (which earned him a scholarship to the Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond) and baritone sax to the alto and sopranto horns, Wilson had the opportunity to study or perform with jazz greats Jimmy and Percy Heath, John Hendricks, Jaki Byard, Frank Foster, and Ellis Marsalis. In 1986, Wilsonlanded a chair in the band

OTB (Out of the Blue), a sexter of promising young East Coast musicians sponsored by Blue Note records. The n ext summer, he made the big move to New York City, and continued to perform with OTB until 1989. He also toured the U.S. and Europe for a year with the Lionel Hampton Orchestra, and signed on as a hornman with fellow OTB alumnus Ralph Peterson's acclaimed Quintet and Fo'tet.

At the dawn of the 1990's, Wilson expanded his universe and his sideman's chops through high-profile gigs Rosewoman, Renee Rosnes, and the American Jazz and Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks orchestras. He also joined the Buster Williams Quintet.

The 1999 Ellington Centennial commemorative tour



Wynton Marsalis and the entire Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra play to benefit Young Audiences

Portland, OR - Wynton Marsalis and the entire Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra launch their global tour of The Ellington Centennial celebration called America In Rhythm and Tune at 7:30 PM on March 10, 1999 at the Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall. The Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra chose Portland as the first stop for the commemorative tour which will visit 35 additional cities in the United States, and for the first time in Portland the entire Lincoln Center Orchestra will accompany Marsalis. Not only does the concert celebrate the 100th anniversary of jazz legend Duke Ellington, but also it supports potential artists by raising funds for Young Audiences.

During the 1998-1999 season, Wynton Marsalis and his Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra will inaugurate The Ellington Centennial with their America in Rhythm and Tune concert. The Ellington Centennial is a yearlong acknowledment of Duke Ellington's contributions to jazz music. Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington is considered by many to be America's greatest composer,

bandleader, and recording artist. The Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra will embark on six months of national and international touring featuring all Ellington programs, working with major performing artts organizations across the world. Ellington would have been 100 years old on April 29, 1999, and Jazzat Lincoln Centeraims to be the center of the international celebration of this great artist.

Wynton Marsalis, the first jazz artist to be awarded the Pulitzer Prize in music, is considered the most accomplished and acclaimed jazz artist and composer of his and a distinguished classical musician as well. A recipient of eight Grammy Awards, Marsalis serves as a mentor to future generations of musicians, sharing his soul on a series of recording and through his vision as Aristic Director of the internationally renowned organization Jazz Lincoln

Center (JALC). Marsalis, a board member of National Young Audiences, honors his commitment to the arts in education by using the concert to benefit Young Audiences of Oregon and

Southwest Washington, the local chapter of the nation's leading arts in education organization. Young Audiences seeks to enhance young people's education with creative resources from the arts community. Each year Young Audiencespresents over 1,500 arts events or over 200,000 local arts lovers. At a time when the arts are vanishing from the classroom, Young Audiences makes the arts affordable to schools throughout the state by subsidizing the cost of school performances, residencies and workshops presented by talented local musicians, storytellers, dancers, theatre, and visual artists.

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
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
