

Free Immunization Clinic at Southeast Fred Meyer

Free immunization against diseases which typically target children are being provided at the Southeast Fred Meyer store on Saturday, March 20th from 10 AM until 2 PM. Vaccines include measles, chicken pox and mumps for young children and Hepatitis B for older children and adolescents. No appointment is needed, but previous immunization records should be brought to the clinic. Please not that flu shots will not be provided.

Clinics are sponsored by Fred Meyer stores and provided by the Multnomah County Health Department, NW Medical Teams and Fred Meyer pharmacies as part of an ongoing program designed to target children from uninsured and underinsured families living in Multnomah County. Many of these children are not allowed to attend school until their immunizations are current.

Fred Meyer began working with Multnomah County on this project in 1997 and has helped immunize more than 800 children. Through this initiative, the immunization rate of children in Multnomah County who have reached their second birthday has increased from 50% to 73% over the past three years.



Violence Free Spring Break Collaborative Effort For Youth

Youth will have the opportunity to participate in the sixth-annual Violence Free Spring Break, March 22-26, 1999, in sites throughout the metropolitan area. A group of individuals and non-profits have joined together to provide a coordinated effort among communitybased organizations, youth counselors, and local community centers to reduce the potential for violent activities by youth during Spring Break. For youth, the week will kick off on Monday, March 22, 1999, at various locations including the PAL Youth Center (424 NE 172nd), Robin Hood Theater (Sherwood), and at local community centers. It closes with a barbecue open to the public on Friday, March 26th, at 1 PM, at the PAL Youth Center.

An emphasis this year will be increasing awareness that providing alternative activities to youth is an excellent way to prevent violence, and prevent alcohol, tobacco, and other drug abuse. "Many people underestimate the value of keeping kids active and involved during the hours they aren't in school," said PAL Assistant Director Maria Honl. "Programs like Violence Free Spring Break help us spread the message that prevention is a crucial piece in creating a healthy and safe community."

The U.S. Department of Education has notified the Oregon Department of Education that Oregon schools will receive a federal grant of about \$11.6 million this year to hire teachers and reduce class size.

Early estimates indicate that approximately 300 new teachers could be hired before next school year.

The Center, designed for PSU students, faculty and staff needing part-time childcare assistance, was funded by a student-approved fee increases. First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton praised PSU students to increase student fees to pay for oncampus childcare. Fees at the childcare, which can accommodate up to forty-two children at a time, range from \$2 to \$3 an hour.


Students, faculty and staff can schedule in two-to four-hour blocks, or they can use occasional drop-in care.
