

Board Member Recognized for **Public Service**

Governor John Kitzhaber, in a surprise announcement, today told State Board of Education member Susan Massey she is the Oregon winner of the "Education Hero" award sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education.

The award signed by U.S. Education Secretary Richard Riley, recognizes those who undertake exceptional activities to help children learn.

"As you believe in Oregon schools, your friends in education believe in you," Kitzhaber told Massey. The Oregon School Boards Association, Confederation of Oregon School Administrators and Oregon Department of Education endorsed her nomination.

"There are few people who can match Susan Massey's dedication to public service," said State Schools Supt. Stan Bunn. "She is a quiet but forceful leader in improving Oregon schools."

Massey, who lives in North Bend, is a former teacher. She was active in the North Bend PTA and served on the North Bend School Board for 12 years. She was appointed to the State Board of Education in 1991.

She called attention to the need to

strengthen character education in Oregon schools. As an education policymaker, Massey said, "Loneliness stalks where the buck stop. We all hunger in our schools for love, comfort and the support of others. It

is vitally important, as well, to remember to do our best in providing those things for the boys and girls who will take our places in the next generation.

There are currently an estimated 600,000 children in foster care and 70,000 available for adoption in the U.S. While the adoption market for infants continues to soarprivate agencies have long waiting lists and charge up to \$30,000 for a newborn-older children have a much harder time finding homes. To counter the high costs and difficulties of traditional adoptions, there has been a growing trend to organize group gatherings that introduce children ages 3 to 17 to prospective parents. The emotional journey for the hopeful parents begins six weeks before the picnic in Tylertown, Mississippi, when couples attend "parenting sessions" run by Sylvia Sessions, an adoption specialist and organizer of the picnic. The couples are apprised of the joys, trials and realities of parenting in general, and specifically of children who may come burdened with problems requiring special patience and love. The couples see photographs and learn a bit about the children they will meet at the picnic.


