

Ken Griffey Jr. couldn't have picked a more appropriate stage for the latest milestone of his career, as the young slugger hit his 361 sthome run at Yankee Stadium Saturday.

The homer, Griffey's 11th of the year, tied Yankee legend Joe DiMaggio for 45th place on the career list.

DiMaggio, who died in March, played 13 seasons from 1936-51. missing three years because of World War II, while Griffey is in just his 11th season.

"I don't worry about that stuff," Griffey said. "I just play baseball and hope something happens."

Venus Williams Beats Pierce in Second Final in Seven Days

Mary Pierce has quickly grown tired of seeing Venus Williams on the other end of the court.

For the second straight week, Pierce reached the final of a tournament, only to see Williams beat her for the title. It happened today when Williams, the third-seeded American, posted a 6-4, 6-2 victory over the ailing and fourthseeded Frenchwoman to capture the \$1.05 million Italian Open.

Bothered by a tender left thigh that was wrapped heavily, Pierce could not contend with Williams, who has won eight straight matches on red clay. One of those victories came a week ago against Pierce in the final at Hamburg, Germany, and before that win had never won an event on clay.

Trail Blazers 110, Suns 99 #1 in Compaq Classic By LANDON HALL NEW ORLEANS (Reuters) -

Paraguayan Carlos Franco fired a 6under-par 66 Sunday to record a twoshot victory over Harrison Frasar and third-round leader Steve Flesch at the \$2.6 million Compaq Classic.

The 33-year-old Franco, who has five victories on the Japanese Tour, started the day two shots behind Flesch but finished at 19-under 269, setting a 72-hole course record at the English Turn Golf and Country Club.

Franco, who joined Roberto de Vicenzo as the only South Americans to capture a PGA Tour event, earned \$468,000.

"This was the biggest week of my life," said Franco. "I'm very proud of what I did, I'm very proud for my country. It's very important that Paraguay is known for golf. Playing in America is a lifelong dream."

Franco received a parade in his native Asuncion after finishing sixth in the Masters and expects another hero's welcome when he returns home following next week's Byron Nelson Classic.

He has been bothered by tendinitis in his wrist and arms and almost withdrew from the tournament before it began. "I think I made the right decision,"

said Franco. "This week was my week. I'm hitting everything great, driving great, great irons, putting great."

In addition to his success on the Japanese Tour, Franco has won in the Philippines, Singapore and every country in South America except Bolivia, which does not have a tournament.

Franco got to 19-under by sinking an eight-foot birdie on the 15th hole and held on by parring the final three holes. He had seven birdies and recorded his only bogey on the par-5 sixth hole, where he hit his approach shot into the water.

"The last four or five holes, the holes got narrower, the greens were 50 percent smaller and the fairways longer," he said. "It was incredible."

A member of the 1992 World Cup team, Franco joined Glen Day as the second first-time winner on the PGA Tour this year and became the eighth foreign-born player to win in 1999. He also moved into the top 15 on the money list with \$814,520.

In addition, Franco became the first rookie to win on the Tour since Gabriel Hjertstedt captured the 1997 B.C. Open. Flesch, who turns 32 later this month, fired a final-round 70 and posted his first top-10 finish of the year. He took home \$228,000, raising his season earnings to \$337,536 in 12 events. Last year's PGA Tour Rookie of the Year, Flesch was denied his first Tour victory, finishing second in this event for the second straight year. But he was thrilled for Franco. 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PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - You'd expect the Portland Trail Blazers to be showing some of their youthful cockiness with a 2-0 lead over Phoenix and a season-long dominance over the Suns.

It's a sign of maturity, then, that even playoff novices like the Blazers know that it will be a different series in Phoenix. And they can see themselves taking a tumble should they fail to keep the pressure on.

"We're as good as any team in the league, point-blank," Portland guard Greg Anthony said after the Blazers' 110-99 victory over Phoenix on Monday night. "But we still have periods, after we've played well, when we let up. We still don't have the killer instinct it takes to grab a team by the throat and end it."

After a scoring burst that began late in the third quarter, the Blazers were never really threatened by the Suns, who have lost all five games to Port-

land this season. But after a first quarter in which the Blazers shot 71 percent and led by 16, the Suns outscored them 82-77 the rest of the way.

Phoenix ended the game with a flurry, scoring 25 points in the final six minutes, including four 3-pointers in a span of 2:07. The Blazers' slack defense infuriated coach Mike Dunleavy and showed what can happen when the Suns get on a shooting streak.

"We were a little too comfortable at the end. We hit a lull," Dunleavy said. "I can tell you this: You can't fall asleep at the wheel against this team."

Brian Grant scored 22 points, Rasheed Wallace had 21 and Damon Stoudamire had 22 points and 13 assists for the Blazers, who shot a season-high 57 percent. Isaiah Rider, who scored 25 points in Saturday's 95-85 Game 1 victory, added 17.

It was the Suns' goal to take away Rider's easy looks at the basket by double-teaming them, but that strategy quickly fell apart Monday night. Rider had three assists in the opening

quarter, including one on the very first possession of the game.

Rider got the ball down low against Rex Chapman, and the Suns doubled on Rider, but he bounced the ball to Stoudamire, who swished a 3-pointer. Portland made 10 of its first 14 points and quickly led 22-7.

Rider ended the quarter on a 41-foot desperation 3-pointer to beat the buzzer and give the Blazers a 33-17 lead.

"When you come out in the first quarter and go down 33-17, it's really hard to overcome," the Suns' Clifford Robinson said. "We fought our way back into it, but it's hard to overcome a team that is as confident as the Blazers."

Surprisingly, the Suns did come back. Portland led only 52-47 at the half, despite shooting 63 percent. Phoenix pulled within 67-66 with 2:22 left in the third quarter, but the Blazers went on a 22-6 run over the next 7:43. Stacey Augmon's three-point

wasn't a factor. He played just seven minutes and scored three points.


With little scoring punch from his starters, Suns coach Danny Ainge was forced to go small with forward Danny Manning and guards George McCloud and Pat Garrity. They all played extremely well, combining for 41 points. But it wasn't enough.

"As starters, we might be relying on (the bench) too much," said Jason Kidd, who had 12 points and 12 assists, but just one point after halftime. "We have to get a fire lit under our butts to get us going. If the first unit isn't doing it, then we're in big trouble."

McCloud and Garrity each had 15 points to lead the Suns. Robinson had 14.

The Blazers, who haven't advanced past the first round since 1992, aren't willing to count the Suns out.

"As far as I'm concerned," it's still zero-zero," Rider said. "That's a dangerous team, and if you take them for granted, they'll beat you. We've got confidence against them, period. But we've got to come out and do it all over again. We can't let down." Notes@: Game 3 is Wednesday night in Phoenix The Suns' reserves have outscored the starters 98-86 in the series. ... Grant broke his career playoff high of 18 points. ... Chapman is 6for-25 in three games against the Blazers this season. He missed two games because of injury. ...
