Grants Help Neighborhood Associations Identify Resources

Vancouver Heights, West Minnehaha and Arnada Neighborhood Associations are the recipients of a grant to conduct a survey identifying the assets and resources available within their neighborhoods. A total of 3,852 residences including apartments, single-family homes and commercial businesses will be surveyed.

The Neighborhood Asset/Talent Survey asks neighborhoods the question, "What resources do we have to solve our problems ourselves?" Because a community is made up of people not houses, the process starts by mapping available human resources. All citizens have valuable skills to contribute. The ability to create databases, cook or plant a garden is valuable to people who do not possess those skills.

The Neighborhood Talent/Asset Surveys are made possible by a grant from the Clark County Department of Community Services. Each neighborhood will plan, create and implement its survey in a manner they feel they will get the best results. The neighborhoods were selected base upon the following criteria:

· Ability to identify preliminary uses for the survey information

· Understanding the benefits of conducting a talent survey in the neighborhood;

· Ability to generate enough enthusiasm within the neighborhood to conduct their survey (e.g. volunteers)

City Supplies Paint For **Neighborhood Homes**

Since 1990, over 500 homes in neighborhoods across Vancouver have received a free, fresh coat of paint thanks to the Neighborhood Self-Help Paint Program. Vancouver residents may apply for a home improvement grant through the Neighborhood Self-Help Paint Program which is funded by the Community Development Block Grant program (CDBG). The Neighborhood Self-Help Paint Program provides the paint and supplies for painting the exterior of homes within Vancouver city limits (labor not included). To qualify, homes must be a singlefamily residence, or a rental with one to four units, within the city limits; be a permanent structure; and occupants must be within the gross income limits as indicated in the following chart.

Film Features **Diverse Cowboy** Heroes

As a child, Cedric Wildbill listened to George Fletcher's stirring stories of long-ago rodeo days. Only as an adult did Wildbill realize the significance of the cultural history embodied in the stories of Fletcher and other forgotten rodeo heroes. "American Cowboys," a film documentary produced by Wildbill and his wife Tania, is a tribute to two legendary rodeo performers who struggled against the racial prejudice typical of the early 20th century West to achieve membership in the Pendleton

Round-Up Hall of Fame. Cowboys Fletcher and Jackson Sundown faced enormous obstacles. Fletcher, an African American, was acknowledged as the best bronco rider in the 1911 Round-Up, but the judges resisted awarding the prize saddle to a black man. Sundown, a Nez Perce, was likewise not the judges' favorite in 1916, but a fervent public outery won him the saddle brone championship.

The film tells these stories with rare photos, restored film footage, narratives from historians, accounts from family and tribal members and narration by Oscar winner William Hurt. Oregon Public Television was executive producer.

The first Vancouver-Portland area showing, presented by City of Vancouver Heritage Education, is Thursday, June 24, at 6 p.m. in the auditorium of Vancouver Barracks in the Vancouver National Historic Reserve. City Council To Discuss Outside Review Of The Police Bureau

The Portland City Council voted to accept a final report issued by the Institute of Law and Justice regarding the Portland Police Bureau at 9:45 a.m. Wednesday, June 16, in the City Council Chambers, City Hall. Mayor Vera Katz and Police Chief Charles Moose will present the plan to Council. Testimony from community and Bureau members is also planned.

The report represents findings and strategies gleaned from more than 40 focus groups conducted in the fall and winter of 1998-99. Focus groups were held with Police Bureau employees, community groups, government agencies and a panel of national community policing experts. The report also includes an analysis of the demographics and population data from Portland the metropolitan area.

Ten vision statements of what the Bureau should achieve in the future. along with accompanying strategies of how to achieve them, are outlined in the plan. They cove increasing the use of new technology, improving expanding the role of police officers, and increasing the focus on crime analysis and prevention.

Christopher James Joseph Roberts, 14 (DOB12/29/84) of Aloha was crossing Baseline at 170th around 3 PM. The MAX crossing arms were lowered, lights flashing and bells were ringing as a westbound train

cleared the intersection. Roberts crossed the street walking towards the tracks and was struck by an eastbound train. The operator hit the emergency brake and honked his horn, but was unable to stop in time.

Gun Show Background-Checks Likely

Customers might NOT be able to buy firearms free-and-clear at Oregon gun shows much longer. Gun-control advocates have been pushing for background checks at the shows, and that element survived in a bill that was otherwise heavily modified by an Oregon House committee. Lobbyist John Hellen, with the Oregon Gun Owners Association, doesn't like the bill, but is resigned to the fact that

some sort of gun-control will probably pass. Hellen says the legislation would penalize law-abiding citizens. But police say a lot of criminals pick up weapons at gun shows too.



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
