Meyer Memorial Awards \$1 Million Grant to S.E.I.

Prestigious non-profit funding organization continues 10-year record of outstanding support

Self Enhancement, Inc., (SEI) announces Meyer Memorial Trust has awarded a \$1 million grant over the next five years in the form of a challenge grant

in which SEI will raise matching funds to benefit SEI's Elementary School program. This is the 10th year Meyer Memorial Trust has contributed to the non-profit youth organization with its first grant award to SEI going directly to fund the founding of SEI's Elementary School Program in 1989.

SEI's Elementary School Program is the first point of entry for SEI participants, beginning in the second grade. Through the

Elementary School program, SEI participants receive positive options, support and safety. The 10th anniversary of the Meyer Memorial Trust grant to SEI coincides with SEI's first graduating class to have been a part of this program since its

"No other agency offers this kind of intensive, continuous and comprehensive support as our Elementary School Program," said Tony Hopson, founder and president, SEI. "Meyer Memorial Trust

gave us the opportunity to begin offering this program ten years ago and will celebrate SEI's Class of 2000 as its first graduating class from the program.

SEI's Elementary School Program provides structures, goal-oriented personal development and violence prevention services to more than 500 second-through fifth grade inner-city Portland youth each

year. The Elementary School Program provides for case management of an advocacy for SEI participants within schools and within the community, tracking scholastic achievement and behavior. During after school hours and on the weekend, the program provides supervised, taskfocused education, recreation and performing arts activities that provide safety and options not typically available to inner city youth.

During summer months the program provides an expansion of the after-school program to an all-day program.

The late Fred G. Meyer who established the chain of retail stores created the Meyer Memorial Trust his name throughout the Pacific Northwest. When Mr. Meyer died in 1978, his will established the Trust, bequeathing it nearly two million shares of stock in Fred Meyer, Inc. All stock in Fred Meyer, Inc. was sold prior to the beginning of the Trust's operations and there is no relationship be-

tween the company and the Trust. At the close of its fiscal year on March 31, 1999, the trust has assets of approximately \$450 million, making it one of the largest foundations in the

United States. Founded in 1981 by Tony Hopson, SEI is a non-profit organization committed helping Portland's innercity youth make positive choices to achieve their full potential. Located in north Portland, SEI provides young people with constructive options for personal success to help them avoid the pitfalls of drugs and violence. Today, SEI serves 1,200

school-age youth with services in 11 Portland public schools in north/northeast Portland as well as in after school and summer program in its new Center for Self Enhancement. SEI has been recognized as a
