Oregon's Own Smith Reaches Contract Agreement

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CINCINNATI (AP) - Akili Smith agreed to a seven-year contract with the Cincinnati Bengals on Monday, ending an impasse that caused him to miss most of training camp and two exhibition games.

The seven-year deal includes a \$10.8 million signing bonus and will pay Smith as much as \$56 million if he reaches various performance goals along the way.

The deal contains one voidable year, meaning it will automatically shorten to six years if he's in for 35 percent of the plays in his first year or 45 percent any following year. "Contracts are so statistical, especially for quarterbacks, and have a level of complexity that it simply takes time to work through," Steinberg said.

The Bengals weren't counting upon Smith to play much this season - he's been slotted as Jeff Blake's backup. But by missing most of training camp, he has missed important development time for a quarterback.

"Who knows how fast he can pick it up?" Coslet said. "He's pretty bright. He's a couple of years older than a normal rookie, so he's pretty mature. And I think he probably has been working with the stuff we sent him, but that's not the same as being on the field time after time after time."

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NEW YORK (Aug. 22) - After nearly six hours of baseball, one dramatic comeback by the New York Mets and nearly another, all anyone could talk about was Mark McGwire's monstrous 502-foot blast in the first inning of the first game.

"That was pretty cool. Nothing he does surprises me anymore."

McGwire hit two home runs in the opener to become the first player to reach 50 homers in four consecutive seasons before the Mets came from five runs down to win on Edgardo Alfonzo's RBI single in the ninth inning.

"I've always thought 50 was the

WASHINGTON (Aug. 23) — A few years after being written off by the rest of the tennis world, Andre Agassi is once again one of the sport's elite players.

The win was Agassi's record fifth Legg Mason title, accompanying others in 1990, 1991, 1995 and 1998. The tournament's No. 2 seed earned \$99,000, while Kafelnikov, the top seed, received \$52,000.

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Gossett Defeats Kim in U.S. **Amateur**

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) -David Gossett had just wrapped up the U.S. Amateur Championship, matching the biggest margin of victory in the event in a half-century. Then he began wrapping up a memento from his win.

Gossett, a sophomore at Texas, carefully rolled up the yellow flag from the pin at the 10th hole where he completed his 9 and 8 win over Korean high school junior Sung Yoon Kim on Sunday and stuck it in his back pocket.

"It's pretty awesome. It was a long week here at Pebble Beach," said Gossett, who received a good luck fax from Texas alum Tom Kite before the

final and a congratulatory call from another Longhorn, Ben Crenshaw, after the victory. "I was focused each day. It's been a lot of hard work and it's paid off."

Gossett, who played nearly flawless golf on the fog-shrouded Pebble Beach course, finally made a mistake after completing his victory. As he hoisted the championship trophy, the top fell off and dropped to the 10th green.

"I don't know if David Gossett always plays the way he did today. If he plays that way, his best will be better than my best," Kim said through an translator. "David Gossett's best day is better than my best day."

Then he hugged his dad and finally showedsomeemotion, sticking his tongue outandsmilingwhile lifting the trophy. He had just made a "Hook 'em Homs" signal with his hand-not unexpected for a Texas Longhom-when the top of the trophy fell.

The victory earned Gossett exemptions into next year's U.S. Open and British Open. Both finalists get an invitation to play in next year's Masters, as long as they remain amateurs.

Kim, 17, came within a victory of becoming the youngest champion in Amateur history and the first non-North American to win the title since Harold Hilton of England in 1911.

The youngest player to win the U.S. Amateur was Tiger Woods, who captured the first of his three consecutive titles in 1994 at 18.
