and the Technical Opportunities Program, where students prepare for jobs in the carpentry, electrical, automotive and computer science and repair trades. In cooperation with Intel, Associated General Contractors, the City Of Portland and others, students who complete this program will be able to enter apprenticeship programs with earned credit after high school.


Students can look forward to the same support programs at Jeff such as Self Enhancement, Incorporated (SEI), whose on-site coordinators work with students and teachers to improve academic achievement. I Have a Dream has 14 Americorps volunteers in the building to work with the students to prepare them for their college experience. Project Plus is a college preparatory program that works with students who may not be part of the I Have a Dream program. The Betty Shabazz Academy works with freshman and sophomore girls providing mentoring and cultural experiences. Students will also enjoy the opportunity to be the latest in a long history of athletic champions when they participate in and engage Jeff's athletic program. For students wishing to play sports but unable to pay the \$90 fee, there are some fee waivers available. The Students Health Clinic will continue to provide health care on a confidential, free and sliding scale

This year students will have a number of new programs and opportunities available to them. A second foreign language, French, is being offered. Advanced Placement classes are now available in Chemistry, Art, History and English, giving college bound students the opportunity to go beyond the course work offered in the regular curriculum. For those working on preparing to meet State Benchmarks in math, the PLATO computer lab allows students to work on self-paced modules designed to teach and reinforce those basic skills on which they will be tested. While the Sylvan Reading Lab will still be in operation for 9th and 10th grade students seeking to improve reading skills to meet the State Benchmarks, an additional Corrective Reading program is in place for students needing extra help. Also new are the hours of the school day. This year the school day is 8:15-3:00, still with 4 academic blocks but with a ten minute rather than a five minute passing time.

The Renaissance Incentive Program headed by Raina Beavers, host of NorthEast Spectrum, is designed to reward students for doing the right things. Ms Beavers is not looking at a top down program, "the ...plan is to develop and implement
