Kinkel is charged with killing two students during the shooting spree a day after he allegedly murdered his parents, May 21st, 1998.


The Beaverton Police Department, in cooperation with Crime Stoppers, is asking for your help in identifying and apprehending the suspect involved in a scheme to pass "bad" checks throughout the Portland metropolitan area.

According to investigators, the individual was able to obtain fraudulent identification from the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles in the names of Alex Earl Bally (D-O-B 1/26/76) and Shawn Adam Treke (D-O-B1/25/75).

The suspect then used the identification to open fraudulent bank accounts, which were used to pass stolen and counterfeit checks. At one time the suspect was working with three other individuals in a group referred to by investigators as the "Million Dollar Club" because of the large amount of money that passed through the fraudulent accounts.

The suspect is described as a white male in his 20's, 6" tall, weighing 190 pounds.

Crime Stoppers is offering a cash reward of up to \$1,000 for information, reported to Crime Stoppers, that leads to an arrest in this case, or any unsolved felony crime, and you can remain anonymous. Call Crime Stoppers at (503) 823-HELP.

## Take The Chill Out

### PGE Volunteers Team Up With Community Energy Project

Armed with caulk guns and rolls of heavy duty vinyl, more than 120 volunteers from Portland General Electric (PGE) will fan out over North and Southeast Portland this Saturday, Sept. 25, to weatherize homes for seniors and disabled citizens. The goal of the undertaking, spearheaded by Community Energy Project, Inc., is to weatherize 20 homes over the weekend and a

total of 60 homes by the end of the year. This event helps celebrate the 20th anniversary of Community Energy Project, a nonprofit organization that helps low-income families in Portland control their utility bills through self help, education and volunteer projects.

Since single-pane windows can account for one-third of the heat loss from a house, many of the volunteers will be adding window insulation; simple frames with heavy duty clear vinyl that fit over existing windows. They will also caulk around windows, add foundation covers and take other simple steps to help keep the heat in and the winter chill out.

"This is a project that really touches the heart," explains Vickie Rocker, PGE customer resource representative, who is coordinating PGE's volunteer effort. "It gives PGE employees a very warm feeling—helping those who unable to do the work themselves."

PGE has been a long-time supporter of Community Energy Project, having donated financial and technical assistance over the past two decades. Don Nuttbrock, a PGE residential energy specialist, and Community Energy Project board member for more than ten years, has guided previous, smaller-scale weatherization efforts.

"The people we help are so appreciative. They can't believe that someone would show up on their day off to help them out," says Nuttbrock.

Additional volunteers for this project are welcome. Training will be provided. Citizens interested in volunteering can contact Community Energy Project at (503) 284-6827.
