DePreist Contracts Kidney Disease Dialysis Required

ames DePreist, music director of the Oregon Symphony, has been diag nosed with kidney disease. He started dialysis treatments Monday.

Committed to Cultural Diversity

The disease, officially called focal segmental glomerulosclerosis, is incurable and irreversible, but dialysis treatments allow about 100,000 Americans to live reasonably normal lives. DePreist, 62, promises he will continue to lead the Oregon Symphony with no interruptions to his schedule.

DePreist plans to conduct the orchestra's opening subscription concerts this weekend.

Although doctors don't know how DePreist contracted the disease, his prognosis is excellent, said Dr. Frank Kelly, assistant professor in the division of nephrology at Oregon Health Sciences University. "This does get better, but he can be on dialysis indefinitely," Kelly said.

The Philadelphia-born conductor, who has led the orchestra for 19 years, will undergo three dialysis treatments a week at Oregon Health Sciences Uni-

versity. Dialysis is a process that removes toxins that the kidneys filter out of the blood. Each treatment lasts four hours. "It's an oil and filter change," DePreist said, joking.

Orchestra members learned of DePreist's condition at a morning rehearsal Sunday in the Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall.

"I told them, because of my relative success in dealing with polio, I've been entrusted with kidney disease," he said.


DePreist contracted polio after visiting Asia in the early 1960s. He wears leg braces and conducts while sitting on

Orchestra players were surprised to hear the news, cellist Tim Scott said. "We had no idea there was anything wrong with his kidneys. He's very stoic, very proud, and it's not easy for him to

DePreist learned about his failing kidneys 18 months ago, after his legs swelled, he became acutely tired and his cholesterol abruptly rose, he said. Doctors performed a biopsy and discovered

kidneys were functioning w e 1 1 enough to avoid dialysis until

"It's something you have to adapt to," DePreist said. "There wasn't a frame of reference in dealing with polio, no frame of reference for having a career. You just do it."

ri-Met has won the national "1999 Way to Go!" award from the US Environmental Protec tion Agency's Transportation and Environmental Network and Renew America. The award recognizes Tri-Met's Outreach efforts to learn how the agency could better serve outlying communities. It's Transit choice for Livability program - which has become Tri-Mets standard for developing new service. Tri-Met asked how they would like to see transit work in their own communities and set priorities for that service. Dozens of work sessions led to the creation of five innovative transit routes called "The Local" in Beaverton, Gresham and Oregon City. The Local provided new transit service to residents and businesses, some receiving transit for the first time. The program also served as the foundation for the largest transit service increase in the agency's history
