The design for the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center, designed by Portland's BOORA Architects, will be presented on February 24, 2000. The free lecture, sponsored by the Department of Architecture at Portland State University, will start at 6:30 pm in Room 212, Shattuck Hall,

1914 SW Park Avenue.

Set in Cincinnati, Ohio, the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center is an educational center that will commemorate the historic efforts of the Underground Railroad and raise awareness of the ongoing struggle for freedom among people around the world. The Freedom Center, estimated to cost \$45 million, is scheduled to begin construction in March 2000 and is to open in the spring of


The underground railroad was a system of

cooperation among slave, free African Americans, abolitionists, sympathetic whites and native Americans to help slaves escape and claim the promise of freedom. Cincinnati played a significant role in this story as the Ohio River was the legal and symbolic dividing line between the slave south and the free north.

Rudy Barton, Chair of the PSU Architecture Department states, "This project addresses a very important issue that is at the heart of architecture."

"Buildings have incredible power to symbolize who we are as a people, and a nation. In this case, how can a building represent the physical and emotional struggle between slavery and freedom?"
