numerous accolades including a Dove nomination, two Awards of Excellence as well as two Stellar awards, as well as television appearances. Becton's public remained loyal despite his sophomore project, Heart of A Love Song, falling short of its projections and expectations. It was during this time that William Becton became an announcer for one of the top broadcast facilities in D.C. He is currently at the newly formed Gospel radio network, ABC-Rejoice in that same capacity. Nineteen ninety established William Becton as a songwriter/producer and in 1998, he became an ordained minister.

What the "lost books' of the Bible? Sounds like one of those phony theories about secret revelations or church cover-ups that occasionally make a little money for a certain type of religious-book writer.

But the concept was discussed not long ago in Bible Review, a perfectly respectable magazine published in Washington, D.C., by a writer who's no sensationalist Duane Christensen teaches Bible and ancient history at William Carey International University in Pasadena, Calif., and is the author of a three-volume commentary on the Book of

Deuteronomy

What Christensen refers to are ancient Israelite books that are long since lost but which we know existed because they are mentioned in the Bible. These writings are a mysterious scriptural sidelight.

Christensen lists 54 biblical passages that cite 20 different titles of lost books. But scholars think many of these titles are duplicates. For instance, the "Chronicles of the Kings of Judah," mentioned 15 times, and the "Chronicles of the Kings of Israel," mentioned 18 times, are most likely references to different sections of the same work.

It's also likely that several different

names were used for the same work. And some of the "books" might actually have been mere lists of names, for instance the "Book of the Chronicles" that recorded the Levites (Nehemiah 12:23).

Making allowance for all that, Christensen thinks only two of the 20 titles clearly referred to important lost literary works: the "Book of Jashar" and the "Book of the Wars of Yahweh."

An ambiguous reference to the "Book of the Upright One," which occurs in 1 kings 8:12-13 as read in Catholic and Orthodox churches, but not Jewish and Protestant Bibles, is probably a third citation of Jashar.
