Common's sense will continue to verbally politic his thoughts on his community as well as love and respect for teaching black renaissance through rap.

Not only has the Chicagonative, and new New York transplant Common released his latest project just in time for the summer, but he has released it during a much needed time when people are thirsty for something else record labels and artist drowning heads with platinum want to be wearing wannabe's and Bentley drivin' B-boys. And with this in mind to stay focused on the basic necessities of life, the MC along with his partner (Dudley) have founded the Common Ground Foundation in Chicago to raise capital for community centers, summer camps and scholarships as well as information and awareness of the plight of political prisoners all over

But even as a hip-hop emcee, Common is definitely not worried about image. Putting him in the same artistry as The Roots; which both artist share publicity at okayplayer.com, Common is all about substance.

Common continuously brings it to the masses discussing his thoughts of growing up in the inner city; it's people and its music.
