OBT performs "American Choreographers Showcase" **On Stage**

Oregon Ballet Theatre (OBT) will perform two different programs as part of its tenth annual "American Choreographers Showcase" (ACS) through June 24, 2000, in the Newmark Theatre at the Portland Center for the Performing Arts. Program X will include the Portland premiere of Try McIntyre's hip, contemporary Aliss in Wonderland and Josie Moseley's recent choreographer Charles Moulton and New York choreographer David Parsons' witty dance works, Sleep Study and The Envelope.

Highlighting Program X of the "American Choreographers Showcase" will be Trey McIntyre's Aliss in Wonderland, a multi-media, contemporary interpretation of Lewis Carroll's classic children's book "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland." McIntyre's Aliss in Wonderland uses an enormous television screen in place of the

traditional rabbit's hole as the launching point for the tale, as Aliss is lured by the White Rabbit on a zany journey through a 20th-century media wonderland, complete with backdrop monitors displaying television imagery. The ballet is set to music ranging from Georges Bizet's Carmen to the crooning sounds of Sammy Davis, Jr. Aliss in Wonderland is a co-production with Fort Worth Dallas Ballet, where it premiered in November, and Nashville Ballet, where it was performed in April. The Dallas Morning Star calls Aliss in Wonderland" ... a witty, scrambled and phantasmagoric ... surreal tale." Jeanne Button - who has created costumes for the Broadway show Arsenic and Old Lace, Wings, The Robber Bridegroom, and Henry V designed the costumes for Aliss. The scenic designs are by

Macdonald Eaton, who has worked extensively designing network television specials for Sammy Davis, Jr., Dick Clark, Victor Borgin, Ed Sullivan, and others.
