Meeting on groundwater protection set for June 27

A Town Hall Meeting to discuss the City's Draft Groundwater Resources Education Center, 4600 Columbia Way, Vancouver, WA. D Michael Heywood, Editorial Page of The Columbian, an experienced and entertaining Master of Ceremonies, will conduct the meeting. Clark-Vancouver Television will tape the meeting for rebroadcast on cable Channel 23 (dates and times to be announced).
Vancouver's drinking water comes from groundwater. State law requires the City of Vancouver to protect groundwater by regulating development. The Draft Ordinance, developed by a citizen committee, regulates about 40 new and existing land uses, including residences. In areas that supply groundwater directly to Vancouver's municipal wells, these uses are more rigorously regulated and some new uses are prohibited. The Draft Ordinance also calls for education inspection programs to help residents and businesses understand how certain practices contaminate groundwater and learn what can be done to keep groundwater clean.
The Town Hall Meeting promise to be a vibrant discussion and exchange of ideas about the Draft Ordinance. Members of the Vancouver Planning Commission will be present. A public hearing before the Planning Commission to consider adoption of the Ordinance is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, August 8 with City Council consideration anticipated in the Fall.

Firefighters resist city's effort to weaken fire inspection, oppose fee for service

Contract negotiations could be settled if city used the \$1 million fire budget surplus
Portland firefighters announced their resolve to protect the integrity of the city's fire inspection process, which is under attack by city commissioners. "We have a professional, full-time staff of fire inspectors who do a great job," said Tom Chamberlain, president of the Portland Fire Fighters Association (PFFA).
"It does not serve anyone's interest to cut that team of professional and dilute the inspection process. We also think that maintaining or expanding the existing inspection fee amounts to double taxation process. Property taxes already pay for fire inspection service."
The Portland City Council has made fire inspections part of contract negotiations that have dragged on for several months with the firefighters' union. The PFFA bargaining team recently voted unanimously to reject the city's latest contract.
The Portland City Council refuses to use part of contract negotiations that have dragged on for several months with the firefighters' union. The PFFA bargaining team recently voted unanimously to reject the city's latest contract offer primarily because of the fire inspection issues.
Chamberlain said the City Council refuses to use part of a \$1 million Fire Bureau budget surplus to settle our contact if we would agree to terminating the full-time inspection fee," he said.
"But instead of using part of that \$1 million surplus, the City Council wants to put money back into the general fund to use for other projects."
"Basically, the City Council is offering to settle our contract if we would agree to terminating full-time inspector positions, assigning those duties to regular firefighters and continuing to charge property owners an inspection fee," Chamberlain said.

Child Pornographers Arrested

Sheriff's deputies arrest two suspects on California Warrants
At approximately 1130 hours this date, sheriff's deputies Todd Lautenbach and Mark Galloway arrested two suspects who are wanted by the Kings County Sheriff's Office, Kings County California, on charges of Child Pornography/Computer.
Suspects (1) Daryl Cahail, W/M, d.o.b 12/11/62 and (2) Elizabeth Dumond, W/F, d.o.b 1/27/75 were arrested, without incident, at 8655 SW 11th Avenue in Portland and transported to the Justice Center Jail. The warrants indicate a bail amount of \$1,000,000 on each suspect.

Laidlaw Transit Driver Arrested For Sex Abuse (Charges)

On Friday, June 2, 2000, two 10 year-old female students for the Gresham/Barlow school district, were attending a school function at Blue Lake Park in Fairview. The two students reported to a teacher, that while they were sitting in the grandstands at the park, a school bus driver approached them and had inappropriate contact.
The diver was subsequently identified as 48 year-old Donald Ralph Donaldson who resides at 49009 SW Carpenter Creek Road, in Forest Grove, Oregon. Donaldson has been a school bus driver for the last 5 years, currently being employed by Laidlaw Transit in Forest Grove. On the day of the incident, Donaldson had transported fourth and fifth grade students from the Forest Grove area to Blue Lake Park.
On June 6, 2000, Donaldson was interviewed and arrested by the Multnomah County Child Abuse

Team. Donaldson is charged with 2 counts of Attempt Sex Abuse I, and has been lodge at the Multnomah County Detention Center with a bail of \$10,000. Arraignment is set for June 7, 2000, at 2:00 p.m., at the Justice Center. A photograph of Donaldson is available at the Portland Police Bureau Identification Division on the 12th floor of the Justice Center.
Investigators are concerned Donaldson may have victimized additional children in the Forest Grove Area and ask anyone with additional information to call the Multnomah County Child Abuse Team at (503) 823-0992

The pilot was uninjured. MCSOR River Patrol towed the aircraft to Chinook Landing boat ramp. The plane is a single engine, two person experimental aircraft.
Federal Aviation Administration investigators are on the scene currently and will conduct an investigation.
