#### **Body Identified**

On Saturday, June 17, 2000, at 12:00 p.m., a body was recovered from the Willamette River at the foot of SE Marion Street. An autopsy was performed by the Multnomah County Medical Examiner's Office on Sunday, June 18th, and the cause of death was determined to be drowning. At this point, there is no indication of foul play; the victim has been identified as 41 year-old Richard Samuel Bruscoof 8577 S.E Flavel Drive.

#### PAC2000 to hold second community 'speak out' downtown

The Police Accountability Campaign 2000 (PAC2000) is holding a community speak out in downtown Portland to provide residents of the area an opportunity to speak about their own experiences with police misconduct in a safe place. The event is being co-sponsored by the newspaper Street Roots and by

KPSU radio (1450 AM). This is the second speak out organized by the campaign. The first took place last May and was attended by over 250 residents in north/northeast Portland. The event is being held in the downtown area this time to provide an opportunity to address police misconduct that has been directed against low-income residents, day workers, people of color and the homeless. Mayor Katz and the Portland City Council have been invited to the event.

#### **Collision Sends Five To** Hospital

On Monday, June 26, 2000, at 1:44 a.m., officers responded to a motor vehicle accident in the northbound lanes of I-205 on the Glen Jackson Bridge. Investigation revealed that 51 year-old Allen Wayne Wampler, of Tillamook, Oregon, employed as a construction worker on the bridge, was operating a 1993 Ford F-250 pickup with it's amber caution lights activated. A passenger in the truck was 46 year-old construction worker Bernard Morrison, of Vancouver, Washington. Wampler was proceeding northbound in the inside

lane, in a section of freeway that was closed off with orange barrels and cones. As Wampler turned right into another lane of the closed off section, his vehicle was struck in the passenger side by a northbound vehicle. Both Wampler and Morrison were transported to Providence Hospital with injuries.

The driver of the second vehicle, a 1991 Ford Mustang convertible, was 25 year-0ld Brandon Lee Swart of Vancouver, Washington. 25 year-old Cory Wilson of Vancouver, Washington, was a passenger in the car. After the initial collision with the truck, Swart's vehicle struck a pedestrian construction worker, 51 year-old Stanley J. Marciniuk of Newberg, Oregon.


