Two community centers selected To join worldwide network of Intel computer clubhouses

Technology Centers for Underserved Youth aim to Build Skills, Ideas and Confidence Aiming to make technology accessible to all communities, the Intel Oregon site selected the Beaverton Police Activities League (PAL) and the Salvation Army Moore Street Corps and Community Center in North Portland to join a worldwide network of Intel Computer Clubhouses that will provide underserved youth with access to high-end technology, industry mentors, and practical skills. Each organization will receive more than \$200,000 in cash, furniture and equipment as part of the Clubhouse grant.

"We can't wait to get our Clubhouse up and running," says Jill Showlater, PAL executive director. "The City of Beaverton has changed dramatically over the past decade and it has become a much more diverse community. As this change has occurred, we have also found a growing population of youth who have gone underserved due to their economic situation or cultural background."

Twenty five percent of the students in the Beaverton School District currently qualify for free or reduced meals at school under Federal guidelines for supporting low-income families. At Vose Elementary, one of the closest school's to the PAL center, more than 65% of the students qualify for the federal free lunch program.

"The Intel Computer Clubhouse grant will

allow PAL to play a much larger role in serving these youth." Says Showlater. "The Clubhouse in going to fill a major void for these kids who don't have access to a lot of things including technology."

The Salvation Army Moore Street Corps and Community Center is located in North Portland where a large percentage of the residents also fall in the low-income category. "We're really excited about being able to add the Intel Computer Clubhouse Network to the Center's program menu, says Capt. Doug Riley, center administrator. "We recognize that without access to technology our youth

and their families are at risk of losing their ability to participate fully in the community, in education, in civic life and the workplace. In partnering with Intel as a Clubhouse Network member, we will bridge the technology gap

Safeway hosts open house to present remodel plans for MLK jr. store

Safeway is inviting area residents to a "Community Open House" to view preliminary plans for the \$5 million expansion and

remodeling project recently announced for the Safeway store at 5920 NE Martin Luther King JR. Boulevard.

Safeway will host the "Community Open House" on Thursday August 3, 2000 from 3:00 PM to 8:00 PM at King Elementary School Cafeteria, Located at 4906 NE 6th Avenue, Portland, Oregon. Refreshments will be served. During Safeway's 5-hour Open-House, residents will have an opportunity to view store plans, layout designs and artist renderings, as well as meet and talk with architects, design, construction and real estate staff. Senior management and marketing personnel will also be on hand.

"This Open house is an excellent opportunity foe Safeway to meet community members and to share some exciting plans," said Safeway's Portland Division President Lyle Waterman. The company will expand the 35-year-old store from 33,000 to almost 39,000 square feet by adding to the north side and the front of the store. The remodeling project will also add a number of REDESIGNED and NEW departments to the store, including a new Delicatessen, China Cuisine, Floral, Bakery, Pharmacy, Service Seafood, Meat and Produce Departments. In addition, at least two more checkstands will be added, along with new freezer, refrigeration and cooler cases, new lighting, new floor tile, new interior décor and Safeway's latest exterior façade.

The remodeling and expansion will begin immediately after the city issues the necessary building permits. The permit process, which is a city-driven process, can take up to a year to receive approval. The store will remain open during the remodeling project.
