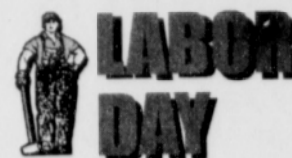

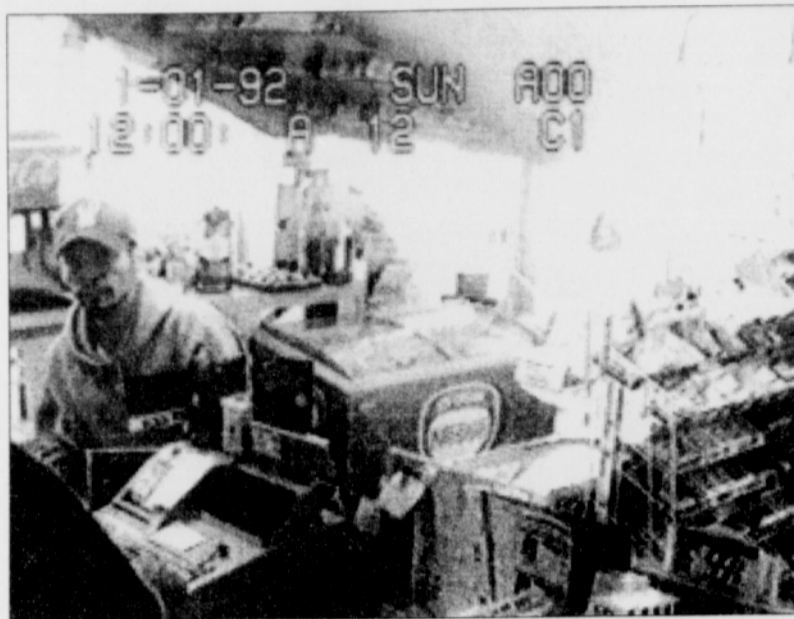

Crime Stoppers



The Portland Police Bureau, in cooperation with Crime Stoppers, is asking for your help in identifying and apprehending the individual responsible for two armed robberies.

On Thursday, August 17, 2000, at about 9:30 in the morning, the suspect entered the Hollywood Market located at 4434 Northeast Sandy Boulevard, and robbed it at gunpoint. Ten minutes later, the same suspect used a handgun

to rob the Rose City Market located at 6220 Northeast Sandy Boulevard. The suspect is described as a white or possibly Hispanic male, 20 to 25 years of age, 5'9" to 6'0" tall, weighing 140 pounds with long dark colored hair, a goatee and sideburns. He was wearing a gray hooded Nike sweatshirt, jeans, and a green baseball cap with the letter "W" on the front. He was armed with a black, semi-automatic handgun. Crime Stoppers is offering a cash reward of up to \$1,000 for information, reported to Crime Stoppers, that leads to an arrest in this case or any unsolved felony crime, and you need not give your name. Community courts should relieve pressure

Individuals arrested for most misdemeanor offenses on Portland's East Side are now arraigned at a Community Court in their neighborhood rather than at a downtown court. Multnomah County's innovative North/Northeast and Southeast Community Court Projects became arraignment courts in June and moved to a weekly schedule in August. In most cases, individual charged with misdemeanors are charged at a Community Court in their neighborhood and assigned a date to return for a plea.

This change should relieve pressure on the downtown courts and bring more of the criminal justice system into a community setting. Almost all misdemeanors and violations are directly cited by police officers into a Community Court for arraignment. Domestic violence cases are not cited

nor are cases involving registered sex offenders, due to the Projects' proximity to public schools. Traffic offenses are also intelligible, unless they are committed in connection with a misdemeanor that is eligible for community court.

The North/Northeast court is in session every Wednesday and the Southeast court hears cases every Thursday. Arraignments begin at 9:15 am, with pleas in the afternoon. Multnomah County Circuit Court Judge Clifford Freeman presides in both courts.

The Community Court Projects provide a swift, effective, and neighborhood-based way to sanction and support misdemeanor offenders. Project partners include Circuit Court of Oregon (Multnomah County), Multnomah County District Attorney's Office, Sheriff's Office, Department of Community Justice, Oregon Indigent Defense Services Division, Metropolitan Public Defenders, and private agencies.

SW 57th Murder Case Information. Alert For Victims Stolen Vehicles

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office and the East County Major Crimes Team is investigating the death of a 53-year-old man found dead in his home at 93945 S.W. 57th this morning. Mr. Wayne E. Olson (d.o.b. 08/07/47) was found dead in his home at 1230 a.m. by his wife who had just returned from an out of town trip case this is being investigated as a murder.

Investigators are looking for the victim's two automobiles that were stolen from the residence some time in the past three days.

Vehicle #1 is a dark green colored, four door, 1998 BMW 325i with Oregon plate VVH-838 on it.

Vehicle #2 is a greenish gold (olive) colored 1998 Jeep Grand Cherokee with Oregon plate WCE-495 on it. Anyone seeing these vehicles should call 911 immediately and not attempt to take enforcement action against the occupants who should be considered armed and dangerous. Investigators are continuing their investigation at this time and are collecting evidence from the crime scene at the home. No further details are being released at this time to protect the success and the integrity of the investigation.

Anyone with information related to this incident or who may have seen Mr. Olson over the past four days is strongly encouraged to contact Sheriff's detectives by calling 261-2815.

Motor Vehicle Stolen in Homicide Found

At 11:30 hours, Thursday, August 24, 2000, Officers from North Precinct and the Portland Police Auto Theft Task Force recovered a vehicle in north Portland belonging to the victim of a homicide in the 3900 block of SW 57th Avenue. The auto is currently impounded as evidence in a crime and is being investigated by detectives from the East Multnomah County Major Crimes Team (MCT). The exact location of the recovery is being withheld until the MCT completes an investigation of the recovery location.

In addition, at approximately 1145 hours today, Portland Police, North Precinct reports the recovery of identification belonging to the victim, Wayne Olson in NE Portland. Exact location of this recovery is being withheld until the MCT completes their investigation at the scene.

Clark County undecided as to destination

Toward the end of this week, Clark County residents will begin receiving a bright-purple-lime-green mailer published by county's Community Development Department. Called "Checking in on our future," it provides information about the upcoming review of Clark County's Comprehensive Growth Management Plan, a blueprint for managing the county's growth over the next 20 years.

Included is an interview with Vaughn Lein, chair of Clark County's Planning Commission. "Many people don't get involved unless something happens in their own backyard," he says. "But in terms of growth management, their backyard may be much bigger than they think." He encourages everyone to participate in the comprehensive plan review. The mailer outlines a number of ways for residents to speak

out about their ideas, concerns, and questions. It announces Citizens Speak, Part I and II. These will be countywide assemblies in September and November, where residents will be able to learn more about the comprehensive plan review and discuss their ideas, concerns, and questions. A number of issues that will be considered during the upcoming review, including revisiting urban growth areas. Tracking population growth. Planning for a variety of housing. Deciding how many homes per acre. Determining zoning. Locating business, industry, and jobs.

Clark County is not the only jurisdiction reviewing its comp plan. All of the county's cities are also revisiting their land-use plans. A map showing each city's current limits and urban growth boundary is included in the mailer, and there is also a list of contact names for the cities.
