# Portland activist Josiah Hill dies at age 61

Hill fought for a better life for his community

BY BRENT HUNSBERGER Whether battling racial profiling by police or testing toddlers for lead poisoning, the common goal

of Josiah Hill's community activism was a better life for Portland's African Americans.

So it numbed that community to learn of Hill's death Thursday, Oct. 12, from a heart attack he suffered while shopping at Nature's Northwest in Northeast Portland. He was 61.

"It's a terrible loss for the community," said state Rep. Jo Ann Bowman, D-

Portland. "Some activists are very confrontational. He was just very gentle."

Friends describe Josiah Hill III, a former physician assistant, as a tireless warrior known for the gentle, disarming approach he brought to a broad array of community concerns, ranging from health care to social equality.

"I can close my eyes now and see him sitting at the table and see his smile," said Lolenzo Poe, chairman of the Coalition for Black Men. "I know as an organization we'll all miss him because he was such a stabilizing force. He was a wise

"The day before he died, we were talking about how the goal at our clinic was trying to drive ourselves out of business," Bayer said. Now, Bayer is unsure whether the screenings will continue after year's end, saying Hill's absence "is just a big

regularly with the police chief - to Hill's memory. Hill was co-chairman of the forum and recently sat on the chief's blue-ribbon committee examining the issue of police profiling.

Hill also mentored fourth- and fifth-graders at Humboldt Elementary School and offered medical help to the Northwest Afrikan American Ballet, occasionally appearing in its annual heritage concert as a village elder.

"It was a perfect role for him," said his wife, Martha Carter Hill, whom he married Dec. 12, 1987. "He's always been so nurturing to everybody.'

Hill was born Feb. 20, 1939 in Washington, D.C. He grew up in Seattle and graduated from the University of Iowa. He worked in Albany for a year before joining the medical team of the Minnesota Vi-

He returned to Portland in 1973 and worked as a physician assistant for Kaiser Permanente for 23 years, specializing in orthopedics and sports and dance medicine. He retired in 1995 for health reasons.

Hill is survived by his wife; mother, Virginia Humes Hill Galloway; daughters, Elizabeth Virginia Simpson and Delane Kennice Hill; sons, Josiah Hill IV and Shanti Bay Hill; sisters, Veronica K. Jones and Juanita M. Washington; and four grandchildren. A public memorial has not yet been scheduled.
