Safety Concerns Stop Gun Lock

Programs

Police agencies in Oregon and Washington, including the Vancouver Police Department, have stopped handing out free cable gunlocks provided by the National Shooting Sports Foundation due to recent reports that the locks can be opened without the key if subjected to sufficient force.


The president and chief executive officer of the National Shooting Sports Foundation, Robert T. Delfay gave these statements. "We have postponed any additional distribution of these locks and we are recommending that no additional locks be distributed by our law enforcement partners while we seek additional information.

"Based on the current situation and the information available to us, however, we are not recommending, at this time, that firearms owners discard or replace any of the Project HomeSafe ? cable locks that may currently be ? affixed to their firearms," Delfay ' said.

A cable lock is not designed or intended to withstand every possible effort to defeat or destroy it," Delfay added. "It has been obvious to all concerned that these locks can be removed with tools available to most homeowners, such as hammers or wire cutters."

On Monday, Nov. 17, 1997, at about 10 o'clock in the evening, 21-year old Mario Herring was walking in the area of NE 14th Place and Going Street when he was approached and shot by a man armed with a chrome semi-automatic handgun. Herring ran to a nearby house for help but died from his injuries.

The suspect is described as a black male, 21 to 23 years of age, 5'11" tall, weighing 170 pounds, with a thin build, dark complexion and high pitched voice.

He was wearing a black down jacket, white sweatshirt, black jeans, black and white tennis shows, and possibly a stocking cap or mask. A car believed to be a white Nissan sedan was seen in the area at the time of the shooting.
