Study Finds Racial, Economic Disparities in Lending

The Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now has released a study finding economic and racial disparities in home mort-

The report found that although the disparity between white and minority denial rates are down nationally, these gains were not realized for African-Americans in the Portland metropolitan area.

Nationally, African-American applicants for conventional purchase loans were denied 1.96 times more often than whites in 1999, a

decrease from 1998 when they were denied 2.09 times more often.

In Portland, African-American applicants were 1.74 times more likely to be denied than white applicants, a 6.7 percent increase from 1988.

"Several decades after the problems of neighborhood redlining and racial discrimination first came to light, we find that these problems still exist and continue to demand public attention," said Maude Hurd, ACORN's National President. Other findings for the Portland area show that the disparity between the denial rates of minorities and whites is greatest among high-income applicants.

Low to moderate income neighborhoods comprise 23 percent of the Portland market, but receive only 12 percent of conventional loans given.

In addition, the study found that lower-income minority homebuyers are significantly more likely than upper-income white homebuyers to use an FHA or higher-cost subprime loans when buying a home.

JFK Nonstop to Portland

Delta Air Lines will introduce a nonstop flight between Portland and New York's JKF Airport beginning April 1.

JKF is Delta's largest international gateway, and with the nonstop flight, Portland passengers can connect to 36 destinations throughout Europe, India and Rus-

The international connections include service to Amsterdam, Athens Barcelona Berlin Bombay Brussels, Budapest, Copenhagen, Dublin, Burban, Dusseldorf, Frankfurt, Geneva, Hamburg, Istanbul, Johannesburg, Lisbon, Lyon, Madrid, Manchester, Milan (Linate and Malpensa airports), Moscow, Munich, Nice, Oslo, Paris, Rome, Stockholm, Stuttgart, Venice, Vienna, Warsaw and Zurich.
