Group to Host Anti-Displacement Forum

Forum offers strategies to keep from being pushed out of your neighborhood by new development, rising costs

The Housing and Community **Development Commission invites** the public to come and share about involuntary displacement issues in your neighborhood at an upcoming Anti-Displacement Public Forum. The event will take place Wednesday, Feb 28, from 6 p.m. -8 p.m. at the Midland Library Meeting Room - 805S.E. 122nd Ave. The Anti-Displacement Forum will allow county residents to learn more about involuntary displacement, its effect on housing and business, and efforts being made to reduce displacement in our neighborhoods. At the public forum there will be time set-aside for the general public to testify about their individual experience with displace-

ment policy options. A number of individuals and organizations plan to attend to offer information and resources to those who have questions and wish to get involved in anti-displacement workgroups throughout the region. "With the rise in property values, how can we as a community create and maintain neighborhoods that literally have room for everyone without pushing some people out?

We would like to hear residents' ideas for how public investments can meet this challenge," says Peg Mallory, member of the Housing and Community Development Commission." The Housing and Community Development Commission (HCDC) is a citizen commission that is the County primary public forum on affordable housing issues for Portland. Gresham and Multnomah County. HCDC will greater information at the forum and use it to advise elected officials and policymakers about anti-displacement

In addition, the consultants must work with the site's rare CM zone. This zone allows commercial and retail activity in buildings up to 45 feet tall, but requires that at least 50 percent of any project be housing.

So far, the consultants have put together three plans for the site. All call for 10 row houses, and 10 lofts above garages, facing Garfield. The garages would be accessed by an existing alley running north and south through the site. On the east side of the property, facing Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard, would be retail buildings with surface parking lots and condominiums over garages. Plan Two would also have these features, but would enlarge the alley to create a new street, and also create a new east-west street

meeting MLK. In Plan Three, this street would be replaced by a public plaza surrounded by firs or other tall conifer trees, possibly as a complement to a restaurant. A straw poll at a recent meeting showed residents equally divided between plans Two and Three.

Some residents liked Plan Three's proposed plaza. Others feared it would be uninviting, given MLK's noise, and would become a desserted space given overto trash. SERA's Paul Jeffries said that a low wall could screen much of the noise. Some public plazas, such as adidas' Harry Jackson Plaza, fails to work "because there's no reason to go there," he said. Others felt it would be better to provide benches and "quiet retail" to the new central street.

So far there is debate about what sort of retail would succeed in the plaza, and what would be desireable.

Consultants say possibilities include an insurance or mortgage brokerage. a chain store such as Radio Shack, or a sit-down restaurant.

Some nearby residents say they don't want anything that would bring too much traffic to the area, and especially night time activity.

In contrast, one man said that a business that is closed and "dead" after 5 p.m. "doesn't add anything to my enjoyment of the neighborhood.

Dorsey hopes the project can play arole in revitalizing the north end of the boulevard. In recent years the new State Farm Insurance Office, and Alberta Simmons affordable housing project with its ground floor retail, have moved in to the north. To the south there is Stellar Coffee, and an expanded Safeway and new Walgreen's due at Northeast Ainsworth Street.






