Task Force to Address Youth Suicide

The United States Surgeon General has declared youth suicide a serious public health concern. Unfortunately, Clark County isn't immune to this issue.

To address the issue locally and to make recommendations for preventing suicide among Clark County youth, a task force is being convened by the county in cooperation with the Southwest Washington Health District, Community Choices 2010, and the Clark County Youth Commission.

The county is seeking people who are interested in serving on the task force, which is expected to meet monthly for approximately six months. Members will be appointed by the Board of Clark County Commissioners.

Nationally, suicide is the second

leading cause of death for youth between the ages of 15 and 24. In Clark County, within the last six months there have been 7 deaths by suicide and a significant number of attempts reported at hospital emergency rooms, crisis services and elsewhere.

"We can't pretend this problem doesn't exist or that it will just go away," said Pride-more. "When we look at our local statistics, they are clearly a wake-up call to take action."

PGE Park Events Are a Ticket to Ride Tri-Met

Tri-Met's Board of Directors has approved an innovative incentive to ride transit to PGE Park (formerly Civic Stadium) with a new, dual-purpose event pass. Starting in April, all PGE Park tickets will serve double duty on the event date as all-day passes for Tri-Met MAX and buses

Someone attending a PGE Park event on a weekday evening, for example, can use the event ticket to ride Tri-Met to work in the morning, then ride to the event and back home again. "Including a transit pass in the ticket makes riding Tri-Met an even more attractive option for people heading to events at the park," said Fred Hansen, Tri-Met general manager. "And it provides a unique solution to the surrounding neighborhood, which was concerned about traffic congestion and parking problems." The new event fare was created through the cooperation of Tri-Met, the City of Portland, the neighborhood and Portland Family Entertainment. It will be tried on a two-year basis on all tickets sold for PGE Park events



Wanted: Your **Best Chicken** Recipe

Don't keep that favorite chicken recipe a secret. Share it with other Oregonians and you could win \$100 and a year's supply of chicken. The Oregon Fryer Commission is seeking the very best recipes using Oregon grown chicken in its annual recipe contest.

Each year the contest draws hundreds of great recipes from around the state. Recipes will be judged on originality, appearance, simplicity and taste. All recipes must use a broilerfryer chicken and should serve four to eight. Grilling recipes also will be accepted.

The first place winner will receive \$100 and a year's supply of chicken. The second place winner will receive \$75 and the third place winner will receive \$50.

To be considered, entries must be legibly written or typed on an 81/2x11 inch sheet of paper and must include the cook's name, address and telephone number. Cooks may enter as many recipes as they wish, but each recipe must be submitted on a separate sheet of paper. A label, found on all packages of Oregon grown chicken, must accompany each entry.

Entries should be mailed to HMH, 1800 S.W. First Ave., Suite 250, Portland, OR 97201, Attention: Oregon Fryer Recipe Contest. Recipes must be postmarked no later than June 1. Recipes become the property of the Oregon Fryer Commission and may be used for promotional purposes.
