# Piedmont to Vote on a New Neighborhood Affiliation

Like the early pioneers who settled the community, the leaders of the Piedmont community think their future lies to the north and west - and not with their longtime neighbors to the south and east.

The Piedmont Neighborhood Association, the official group representing people in the area between the I-5, Northeast Martin Luther King Boulevard, and Columbia and Portland boulevards, want to change its affiliation from the Northeast Coalition of Neighborhoods to that of the North Portland Neighborhood Office. The association intends to put the matter to a formal vote of the membership at its April 26 meeting.

The change would make Piedmont the first neighborhood east of I-5 to be affiliated with the North office, and the only neighborhood

touching on Northeast Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard not to be part of the Northeast Coalition.

Piedmont officially notified the Northeast Coalition and the city's Office of Neighborhood Involvement director David Lane, of the proposal in a Jan. 22 letter from spokesperson Barbara Fisher. In a Jan. 29 reply, Lane called on Piedmont and the two coalitions to proceed in accord with established city proce-

These procedures call for formal votes of the neighborhood association membership, and the boards of the two coalitions. If all three favor the change, it takes place. The policies are less clear about what happens if there is a conflict, but they state that Lane can veto the change if there is not unanimous agreement and he feels that "further discussions will not lead to resolution."

Although none of the groups involved have taken formal positions as yet, there appears to be general support for the move in the north neighborhoods, and substantial unhappiness with it among Northeast Coalition members.

The Northeast Coalition is a non-profit agency that contracts with the city to provide services to volunteer groups. It is governed by a board of representatives from participating volunteer neighborhood associations and other interest groups. They also discuss and take positions on significant issues.

The North Portland office plays a similar role, but it is run directly by the city through ONI. Its neighborhood representatives meet regularly, but officially are merely advisors to a city staff.

The change would mean the transfer of \$1,000 for Piedmont's printing and mailing

assistance from the Northeast office to the North office, and could affect future funding for the two groups.

Piedmont chair Betsy Radigan downplayed the significance of the move in discussions with her membership.

"We're just formalizing a situation that has existed for several years now," she said. "We've been meeting regularly with North Portland for two years now, and we haven't been participating with the Northeast Coalition board for five.'

She later told the Portland Observer, "We never said we're refusing henceforth to work with other northeast neighborhoods," and noted that Piedmont is currently working with the Woodlawn and Humboldt associations on matters of mutual concern.

### PDX Says 'Sayonara' to Asia Flights

(AP) - About 200 people gathered Saturday to say goodbye to the last flights between Portland International Airport and

Delta Air Lines started the nonstop service in 1987. The final two routes, to Tokyo and Nagoya, Japan, have been moved from Portland to New York and Los Angeles, respectively. For Delta's 1,250 employees in the Portland-Vancouver area, Saturday was the last day they will work together.

"It's pretty depressing for everybody involved," said Mike Collins, who was a copilot on the last flight arriving from Narita Airport in Tokyo. "We've all been working together all these years; everybody knows everybody," said Collins, 57, of Olympia. "We have a limited number of flights, and we work with everybody frequently, so we know each other's habits. It's like a family . . and now they're going to be scattered to the four winds."

Shortly before noon, about 40 Delta pilots marched in two lines down Concourse D, where international flights arrive and depart. They stood at attention, forming two lines of 10 people in front of the gate for the Tokyo departure and another pair of lines at another gate for the Nagoya depar-

A bagpipe player led the pilots to each gate. They saluted the processions when they arrived. And continued onto the planes.
