

### Post Office Works to Meet Tax Deadline

The U.S. Postal Service urges customers to avoid the Monday, April 16, income tax deadlineday crowds by mailing their income tax returns early and by ensuring each envelope carries the proper postage. For those who wait until the deadline, post offices in the Portland metropolitan area will collect and postmark tax returns until midnight on Monday, April 16 from blue Postal Service collection boxes in front of designated post offices. These blue collection boxes will be marked with special yellow signs verifying midnight pick-up in front of designated post offices. Allothercollectionboxeswithoutayellowsignwill be picked-up at their posted, regularly scheduled times. "The best option for those who have correct postage and just need to get the April 16 postmark," "is to avoid the crowds by using the blue collection boxes with yellow signs located in front of designated post offices in the Portland area." Portland Postmaster Michael J. Daley said.



## Head Start Coming to Rosemont

An artist's rendering shows the design of a new Head Start facility to be built at North Bryant and Kerby as part of the redevelopment of the Rosemont-Villa St. Rose property. The facility, designed by Sinan Gumusoglu of OTAK Architects, will be 11,000 square feet, and contain 6 classrooms housing up to 84 children. The structure will undergo design review by the city beginning this week. The Piedmont Neighborhood Association at one point expressed concern about inclusion of the facility in the 338-unit residential project. However, spokesperson Tom Markgraf says that at this point, "We have every indication they'll be a real asset to the neighborhood.
