Police Work to Solve Surplus Vehicle Arson



The Portland Police Bureau, in cooperation with Crime Stoppers, is asking for your help in identifying and apprehending the person or persons responsible for an arson fire. On Friday, June 2, 2000, at

3 a.m., the Portland Fire Bureau responded to a report of a fire at Southeast 11th Ave. and Madison St. The location is a fenced storage lot in which the city had parked marked police vehicles, which had



been taken out of service and were to be sold at auction. The blaze, which was believed to be deliberately set, destroyed 17 cars, and damaged another 5. The dollar loss to the City of Portland is estimated at over \$200,000.

Crime Stoppers is offering a cash reward of up to \$1,000 for information, reported to Crime Stoppers, which leads to an arrest in this case or any unsolved felony crime, and you need not give your name. Call Crime Stoppers at 503-823-HELP.

Woman Fights Oregon Prosecution

A 31-year-old woman accused in Washington of stealing public services while posing as a high school student will fight extradition to Oregon. She's accused of filing a false claim that she was molested by a Portland police officer. Treva Throneberry is being held in Clark County, awaiting trial on two

theft charges and a perjury charge. She insists that she is the victim of mistaken identity and she is Brianna Stewart, the name she used while attending Evergreen High School for three years, graduating last June. But Portland police say in 1993, she told officers that she was Keili Traci Smitt and that the alleged

abusive officer was her father. Over 15 years, Throneberry is suspected of using dozens of aliases in cities from Memphis, Tennessee to Vancouver. She allegedly contacted churches, youth shelters and social agencies for help, then telling stories of sexual abuse. Throneberry was arrested March 22nd.

Teacher Pleads Guilty in Sex Abuse

(AP) — A gym teacher in Vancouver pleaded guilty to molesting 6- and 7-year-old girls at the Clark County campus of Portland Christian School. Christopher Stubblefield, 28, pleaded guilty to three counts of first-

degree child molestation rather than facial. Stubblefield, who lives in Gresham, was arrested last fall for investigation of molesting two 6-year-old girls and a 7-year-old girl at the school. The standard sentencing

range for the crimes is as much as 10 years, eight months in prison. Stubblefield's lawyer says he will ask that his client receive probation and counseling instead of prison time.

Make-A-Wish Bookkeeper Charged

A Washington woman who worked as bookkeeper with the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Oregon has been indicted on embezzlement charges. Officials accuse 29-year-old Angel Sederburg of Battle Ground of stealing \$359,000 from the non-profit agency that grants wishes

to children with life-threatening illnesses. Sederburg is charged with forging signatures on checks between Nov. 1998 and July 2000. The checks allegedly were made out to her or a business she controlled. Make-A-Wish officials say Sederburg began working at the

charity in July 1996 and they think she either spent the money or gave it away. They say she altered the books to cover up the theft. Authorities say Sederburg was tripped up when she tried to cash six checks for thousands of dollars at a bank in Vancouver.

Man Charged in Laurelhurst Bombing

A Washington man accused of planting a bomb in the driveway of a Laurelhurst home that ripped off a man's foot faces charges of attempted aggravated murder. A Multnomah County grand jury has also indicted 41-year-old Timothy

Michael Goff on charges of arson, assault, criminal mischief and possessing a destructive device. Police say Goff was so obsessed with a Kennewick, Wash. girl that he planted a bomb in her new boyfriend's driveway. The

bomb exploded when the boy's father, 59-year-old Barry Hornstein, kicked it as he got into his car last September. Police believe the bomb was intended for Hornstein's son, 18-year-old Jack Hornstein.
